INFORMATIONAL/DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. Public Comment

Dr. McMahon opened the floor for public comments at 6:03 p.m. There being no public comments registered, Dr. McMahon closed the floor for public comment at 6:03 p.m.

B. Financial Reports

Mrs. Candice York presented her financial reports. There are 11 proposed fee schedule changes that will be affected for fiscal year 2021. Clinical Services were listed that need to be adjusted to the Medicaid reimbursement rate. The 340 B rates need to be adjusted quarterly to the acquisition rate. Delinquent accounts to be turned over to collections were \$26,895.68, and accounts were old or older than 90 days as of 9/30/19. Revenue earned and expenses for the month closing 12/31/19 was \$43,697. Medicaid has earned 50.01% and we are on target for what should have been earned by this time. The fiscal year has exceeded 56.7% on the fees. Rabies clinic fees were low as we only hold clinic one Saturday and then again in Spring.

Dr. Fleishman arrived at 6:10pm.

C. Introduction of Triple P Staff

Mrs. Ashley Curtice introduced Joshua Harrell and Tamerial Ferguson as the new Triple P Staff. Both staff provided a brief summary of their role with Triple P. Triple P is a parenting intervention with the main goals of increasing the knowledge, skills, and confidence of parents and reducing the prevalence of mental health, emotional, and behavioral problems in children and adolescents.

Mr. John Larch III asked how families get enrolled or is it primarily through the justice system or school system. Mrs. Curtice explained that parents can take classes online for free as well as regional group sessions and discussion groups and seminars.

D. Clinic Reports

Dr. Jennifer Green went over clinic reports showing how many patients were scheduled, seen, no-show's and statistics of services rendered. Dr. McMahon asked about the high cancellation and no-show rate. Dr. Green explained that this is something that has been talked about in great length during times of her shadowing different departments. Dr. Green said that with our new EHR, patients will be able to text right back after they get a reminder text for their appointment. Certain clinics give baby bucks for incentives to patients to spend in the baby store for coming to their appointments. Departments are strategizing to find creative ways to get patients in the door and to keep them coming back.

E. Oral Health Month Activities

Mrs. Curtice spoke about the Get a Gold Smile event that bring awareness to communities for oral health. Providers will be here to screen children and pregnant mothers in the third floor Auditorium. There will be coloring books and another tabletop information. This event is in coordination with Fayetteville Technical Community College (FTCC). This event is to raise awareness; however, they can go over to FTCC and get a dental cleaning for \$5.00. Advertising will consist of posters in lobby.

F. Tobacco Updates

Mrs. Curtice announced the first new federal tobacco regulation was raising the age for all tobacco products to age 21 which happened right before Christmas. North Carolina (NC) is working on public education for retail merchants and signage, this way our stores are consistent with the federal law currently in NC. The second federal regulation was the flavors, so they did ban all flavors except for regular tobacco flavor and menthol. NC is going through a process to figure out if it is safe to be on the market or not, and this should happen in the next year or two.

G. Gen X Exposure Study

Dr. Jane Hoppins presented a Power Point on her study where she had been testing water sampling since 2017 in Wilmington. Dr. Hoppins also brought with her, Dr. Nadine Cutler, an environmental engineer that has been doing research with her and was there to answer questions. Dr. Hoppins has extended her research to Fayetteville within 6 miles of the chemical plant. Dr. Hoppins said that the residents in Fayetteville were among the best research subjects she had ever met. They gave out 99 wristbands and got 91 back. Continued testing has been done in families with at least 5 in the home. Dr. Hoppins is working on getting more funding and of course they have been delayed by Hurricane Florence and Matthew or they would have been in this area sooner.

Dr. Fleishman left at 7:26pm.

H. Friends of the Health Department:

Rev. Dorothy McNeil introduced herself and explained that the reason Friends of Health Department was formed was so that the BOH could help increase public awareness of what goes on in our public health department. Although membership recruitment is not yet complete, the team is working hard to get a team that mirrors what our community is made up of. Rev McNeil spoke briefly about reducing food insecurity in our children and plans to have food available to those parents that are in dire need.

Opioid Epidemic

School Nurses assess, counsel and refer students related to drug abuse issues, including opioids. There were 2,261 students reported as engaged with the school nurse related to known drug abuse with 324 of those student incidents listed as "requiring EMS response or immediate care by a physician, and/or loss of ½ or more days of school." During the 2018-2019 school year 48 substance abuse related presentations were given, and 4,732 individual counseling sessions were provided related to substance abuse. When present, school nurses can respond to emergent symptoms indicative of possible drug influence or overdose. Opioid overdose on school grounds occurs rarely, with five incidents of Naloxone use for suspected overdose reported this school year, all of which were administered by the School Resource Officer. Sixty-one school districts reported having Naloxone available on school grounds through the School Resource Officer and eight through a district wide program supported with local policy and procedure.

Automatic External Defibrillators (AED)

AEDs are used for an immediate response to an emergency when a student or adult appears to have no heartbeat and time is critical for survival. Ninety-eight percent of public-school districts report the presence of an AED on campus. During this school year 15 instances of AED use were reported with the following statistics:

Case Management Outcomes

School nurse case management of selected students with complex health needs involves use of a plan of care that includes specific interventions with achievable goals, measurable outcomes and regular evaluations. Students may have one or more planned outcomes based on identified needs. School nurses may case manage students with a variety of diagnoses. Not all chronic condition diagnosed students need case management services. During this year, 6,553 individual students received case management services at school.

Summary

School nursing services are one component of a local School Health Program. By working with multiple partners in health and education, including the NC Division of Public Health, NC Division of Medical Assistance, NC Department of Public Instruction, NC Pediatric Society, NC Academy of Family Physicians, NC Dental Society, Prevent Blindness NC, NC School and Community Health Alliance, local health departments, and more, school nurses are working to help students achieve at levels they might not otherwise reach. In many school health areas North Carolina can serve as a model for school health programs. In others, services are limited as a result of relatively slow growth in the number of school nurse positions in relation to student population growth and complexity of health care needs. Working towards an increase in the number of school nurses in North Carolina could positively impact overall student health and wellbeing, resulting in improved student attendance and successful academic outcomes.

This data represents key information shared by NC School Nurses via the Annual School Health Report Surveys. The information is based on students known to school nurses who received health related services in NC public schools. It is not intended as surveillance data. Except where indicated the data does not include students in NC public charter schools. Additional data is collected and is available upon request.



- To clarify the school nurse role as the professional health services coordinator and provider within the school health program.

School Nurse Profile


School Nurse Staffing and Nurse-to-Students Ratios



School Nurse Educational Preparation

School nurses are Registered Nurses (RN) with varied educational preparation. In addition to being a RN, national certification in school nursing is the standard by which North Carolina school nurses are assured to have the advanced knowledge and skills required in this independent specialty practice.

A baccalaureate is the minimum degree required for certification eligibility. At the close of the 2018-2019 school year 56% of the total number of school nurses were nationally certified. NC school nurse degree status is indicated in the following graph.



NC Public Charter Schools that Employ a School Nurse

While NC LEA schools are required to provide the services of an RN School Nurse to assess and plan for the health needs of students, public charter schools are not. During the 2018-2019 year 24% of public charter schools reported employing a school nurse, full- or part-time.

Common School Nurse Activities:

North Carolina School Nurses are assigned a varying case load dependent upon school district resources, and serve from one to five schools per nurse. Common school nurse activities include:

- Preventing and responding to communicable disease outbreaks
- Developing and implementing plans for emergency health related assistance
- Planning and providing specialized clinical services and related health instruction
- · Medication and health care procedure oversight
- Assessment, referral, and assuring care for identified health needs
- · Assuring that mandated health related activities are completed
- · Provision of health education and health counseling
- Helping to assure a safe and healthy school environment

A student with a health concern who sees a school nurse is more likely to remain in school. During the 2018-19 school year North Carolina school nurses reported 2,309,119 student encounters. Of those, 90% of students seen by the school nurse were returned to class.

Medication Delivery and Oversight

School nurses provide oversight for medication administration in schools through training, administration, auditing for medication variances and assuring compliance with requirements.
