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Introduction

The end of 2022 marked nearly three years of our COVID-19 pandemic response. Staff in local health departments across North Carolina, including our own, have worked diligently and tirelessly to respond to the pandemic while maintaining our other public health services. We are grateful to the individuals and organizations we have partnered with us to assure face masks, testing, and vaccines were free and accessible to the public. By summer 2022, staff were gearing up to address an emerging communicable disease, MPOX. We worked quickly to make testing, vaccines, and educational materials available to those that were at the highest risk of exposure.



Community Health Assessment

In 2022, a new Community Health Assessment (CHA) for Cumberland County was released. After a more

than year long collaborative data collection process, the following priorities were identified a health priority to focus on for the next three years: Economy, Substance Abuse, Public Safety, and Mental Health. The CHA is a tool for agencies across the county to use to prioritize and take action on health issues that are most impacting our county.



Workforce Development

We continue to enhance our local public health infrastructure and workforce to provide more efficient and effective

public health services with an equity lens. We have hired additional health educators, community health workers, and communications staff that work regionally to share key public health information and engage the public on important health topics. We provided additional training for staff in crisis communications, sharing complex data, and racial equity. In August 2022, we launched a new modernized electronic health record (EHR), which will feature a patient portal in 2023.



Access to Services

We continued to explore opportunities to improve access to services. Access to safe and reliable transportation can result in delayed care or missing appointments. To address this challenge,

we launched a pilot project to provide free transportation using Uber Health to patients receiving services at any of our Health Department locations. Staff also utilized our mobile unit and outreach teams to bring immunizations, HIV testing, and Narcan to neighborhoods throughout the County.



Opioids

We also focused our attention addressing the rising number of opioid overdoses doses and death. A national opioid settlement with several large drug distributors is bringing funding and

resources to address the harms caused by the opioid epidemic. After a series of community listening sessions, stakeholder meetings, and a community surveys, the Cumberland County Commissioners approved the use of initial funding to implement evidence-based strategies. These strategies including Narcan distribution, syringe service programs, medication addiction treatment, and recovery support services.



Strategic Plan

Plans are underway for 2023 and beyond. Our 2023-2027 Strategic Plan will be released in the Spring of 2023 and will outline the plans to meet the priorities of the department for the

next five years. In the plan you will find strategies to advance our priorities, including staff recruitment and retention, quality and efficiency of services, normalizing our COVID-19 response, mental health and substance abuse, and the reduction of rates of sexually transmitted diseases.

Accreditation Team

In order to meet the requirements of accreditation, Cumberland County Department of Public Health developed an accreditation team which consists of 16 staff members who have been working collaboratively to collect, review, organize and upload evidence to support 41 benchmarks (147 activities). Delta Dental Foundation's Smiles for Kids awarded \$2,400 to the Health Education division to provide an educational program titled "Get a Gold Medal Smile".


This project engaged community through social media, providing oral

Newborn/Postpartum Home Visiting Program

This program is a key mechanism for reaching families early with preventive and anticipatory services (a proactive approach to customer service instead of waiting for problems to happen, it means you can avoid a problem happening in in the first place). The nurse provides timely referrals for any needed services and serves as a link to children's preventative services.

Home visits take place within the first 60 days after delivery and any pregnant woman in Cumberland County is eligible for services. The face-to-face visit takes place in the patient's home and includes assessment counseling, teaching, and if needed, referrals to other providers for additional services for both mom and baby.

The Newborn/Postpartum Home Visiting Program was halted in 2022 due to COVID-19.

Workforce Development

A well-trained and well-prepared public health system is vitally important in keeping our community healthy. The COVID-19 pandemic not only brought attention to public health, but it also increased awareness of funding and workforce needs. In the Fall of 2021, Cumberland County received funding by way of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) from the North Carolina Department of Public Health to establish a Regional Workforce Development Director position for region 6, which covers 9 South Central NC counties: Anson, Cumberland, Harnett, Hoke, Lee, Montgomery, Moore, Richmond and Scotland Counties.

The Regional Workforce Development Director works to improve Local Health Department infrastructures and strengthen staff capacity through professional development opportunities.



Tobacco Control

The Tobacco Prevention and Control Branch (TPCB) Cumberland County continues to utilize allotted funding from the Tobacco Prevention and Control Branch (TPCB) of the North Carolina Department of Public Health to fund a Regional Tobacco Control Manager Position for Region 6, which covers 10 South Central counties: Cumberland, Hoke, Harnett, Lee, Moore, Montgomery, Randolph, Richmond, Anson, and Scotland Counties.

The Regional Tobacco Control Manager provides expert leadership and guidance on evidence-based tobacco prevention and control strategies that reduce secondhand smoke exposure, prevent the initiation of tobacco use and promote cessation services for those who wish to quit.

In addition to our work across 10 counties, Cumberland County continues to work closely with Fort Bragg Department of Public Health and UNC Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center on a Military Health Readiness Initiative to address tobacco use and health systems change on the installation.




