RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT CAPE FEAR VALLEY HEALTH SYSTEM'S PETITION TO AMEND THE DRAFT 2010 STATE MEDICAL FACILITIES PLAN TO ALIGN CUMBERLAND COUNTY AND HOKE COUNTY AS ONE MULTI-COUNTY SERVICE AREA

WHEREAS, Hoke County is currently part of a multi-county service area with Moore County for healthcare services since Hoke County does not have a hospital.

WHEREAS, since 2007 for Operating Rooms and 2008 for inpatient acute care beds, and continuing into 2009, the plurality of Hoke County residents seek their care in Cumberland County.

WHEREAS, the population growth rate in western Hoke County and those residents who seek their care in Moore County is significantly less than the population growth rate in eastern Hoke County and those residents who seek their care in Cumberland County.

WHEREAS, both Cumberland County and Hoke County experienced and continue to experience an increased population explosion along the Cumberland County-Hoke County border related to the impact of Base Relocation and Closure ("BRAC") on Fort Bragg.

WHEREAS, Cape Fear Valley Health System ("Cape Fear Valley") continues to petition the State to amend the draft 2010 State Medical Facilities Plan ("SMFP"), to follow the methodology contained in prior SMFP's, regarding multi-county service areas for Acute Care Beds, Operating Rooms, MRI, and Cardiac Catheterization, and to designate Cumberland County and Hoke County as one multi-county service area in the 2010 SMFP.

WHEREAS, the State Health Coordinating Council ("SHCC") has changed the methodology in the draft 2010 SMFP despite the recommendation of the State Medical Facilities Planning Section to follow the methodology and designate Cumberland County and Hoke County as one multi-county service area in the 2010 SMFP.

WHEREAS, the SHCC's proposed change in the multi-county service area methodology could have an enormous negative economic effect on Cumberland County and negatively affect the health care delivery system in the entire region.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the County Commissioners of Cumberland County, North Carolina unanimously vote to urge Governor Beverly Perdue to amend the draft 2010 SMFP in accordance with Cape Fear Valley Health System's Petition to amend the 2010 State Medical Facilities Plan, to follow the methodology in the SMFP, and to designate Cumberland County and Hoke County as one multi-county service area for Acute Care Beds, Operating Rooms, MRI, and Cardiac Catheterization.

UNDER G.S. 160A-20 WITH WACHOVIA CORPORATION

BACKGROUND

The Board of Commissioners has called this public hearing to consider an installment financing contract under G.S. 160A-20 with Wachovia (a subsidiary of Wells Fargo & Company) to provide capital funding under the Qualified School Construction Bond Program (QSCB's). These funds will be used to finance classroom additions, cafeteria expansions, and other renovations to existing school facilities.

Our Financial Advisor and Bond Counsel have negotiated the terms of the financing with Wachovia. These instruments will be issued with a supplemental interest rate which is based upon the tax credit rate set by the Treasury. The initial supplemental rate quoted was 1.35%, but has dropped to 1.20% currently, coinciding with a decrease in the published Tax Credit Rate. We believe this supplemental rate is reasonable. A review of other transactions has revealed supplemental interest rates of 2.0% to 2.50%. The term of repayment is also set by the Treasury, and fluctuates. The current term is 17 years for repayment.

Under G.S. 160A-20, the financing will be secured by a lien on school property, but not by the full faith and credit of the County. G.S. 160A-20(g) requires this public hearing on a contract before entering into it and after notice that the public hearing has been published as required by law. As a part of the proposed transaction, the County would lease the property back to the Board of Education for use as a school during the term of the loan. The property would be conveyed back to the Board of Education at the end of the term of the loan. A copy of these and all financing documents are available for review in the County Manager's office.

RECOMMENDATION

Consider whether to adopt the resolution approving installment financing contract under G.S. 160A-20 with Wachovia for \$15.9M to provide capital funding for school renovation projects and associated documents including deed of trust to Wachovia and lease with Board of Education, and authorize the County Manager to sign on behalf of the County, with such changes or revisions consistent with the general tenor thereof as may be satisfactory to the County Manager and the Interim County Attorney.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners (the "Board") of the County of Cumberland, North Carolina (the "County") has resolved to undertake, through issuance by the Cumberland County Finance Corporation (the "Corporation") of its certificates of participation the financing of (a) renovations to thirteen schools in the County, including Byrd Middle School, Mary McArthur Elementary School, Elizabeth Cashwell Elementary School, Cumberland Road Elementary School, Cape Fear High School, Rockfish Elementary School, Wm. H. Owen Elementary School, Long Hill Elementary School, Cumberland Mills Elementary School, Westover Middle School, Manchester Elementary School, Terry Sanford High School, and E. E. Smith High School (each a "School" and collectively, the "Project") and (b) certain costs incurred in connection with the initial execution and delivery of the such certificates; and

WHEREAS, the County will enter into an Installment Financing Agreement dated as of December 1, 2009, (the "Agreement") for this purpose with the Agreement being an agreement authorized under Section 160A-20 and having payments thereon by the County subject to appropriation; and

WHEREAS, financings pursuant to Section 160A-20 must be approved by the North Carolina Local Government Commission (the "LGC"); and

- 1. a draft dated November 12, 2009, of the form of the Agreement;
- 2. a draft dated November 12, 2009, of the form of the Deed of Trust;
- 3. a draft dated November 12, 2009, of the form of the Indenture;
- 4. a draft dated November 12, 2009, of the form of the Lease; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to approve the Agreement, the Deed of Trust, the Indenture, the Lease and the sale of the Certificates and to authorize other actions in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, the County at its meeting on November 2, 2009, made findings with respect to the Project and the financing thereof; and

WHEREAS, the County has held a public hearing regarding the financing of the Project through the Certificates and the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the LGC will consider the County's application for approval of the Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF CUMBERLAND, NORTH CAROLINA:

- 1. The financing of the Project pursuant to the Agreement and in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Indenture is hereby approved, based, in part, on the findings made on November 2, 2009.

The Chairman or Vice Chairman of the Board and the County Manager, or any of them, are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Agreement, the Deed of Trust, the Lease and the Term Sheet (together, the "County Financing Documents"), which shall be in substantially the forms previously submitted, which are hereby approved, with such completions, omissions, insertions, and changes as may be approved by the Chairman, Vice Chairman or the County Manager, with the advice of the County Attorney and Special Counsel, including such changes as may be required by the LGC, their execution to constitute conclusive evidence of their approval of any such completions, omissions, insertions and changes. The Clerk of the Board shall attest and seal such documents as require the Clerk's attestation and the County seal.
- 3. The Board hereby approves the execution and delivery by the Corporation of the Agreement, the Indenture and the Certificates and any other documents or certificates that may be required in connection with the execution and delivery of the Certificates.
- 4. The Chairman, Vice Chairman, County Manager, County Finance Officer, County Attorney and Clerk of the Board are hereby authorized to take any and all such further action and to execute and deliver such other documents as may be necessary or advisable to carry out the intent of this resolution and to effect the installment financing pursuant to the Agreement. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Chairman, Vice Chairman or County Manager are authorized to approve all details of the financing, including without limitation, the annual payments due under the Agreement, the interest rate on the Certificates (which shall be not exceed 3% per annum), the tax credit rate on the Certificates (which shall be a rate set by the Secretary of the Treasury) and the term of the Agreement (which shall be the maximum term permitted by the most recent announcement of the Secretary of the Treasury). Execution of the Agreement by the Chairman, Vice Chairman or County Manager, as the case may be, shall conclusively evidence approval of all such details of the financing.
- 5. To the extent permitted by law, the County Manager, or such other officer or employee of the County as may be responsible from time to time for the preparation of the County's annual budget, is hereby authorized and directed to carry out the obligations imposed by the Agreement on such officer or employee.
- 6. All other actions of the officers of the County which are in conformity with the purposes or intent of this resolution and in furtherance of the execution and delivery of the Agreement, including the execution of the County Financing Documents are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed. The representations of the County made in the Agreement are hereby confirmed.

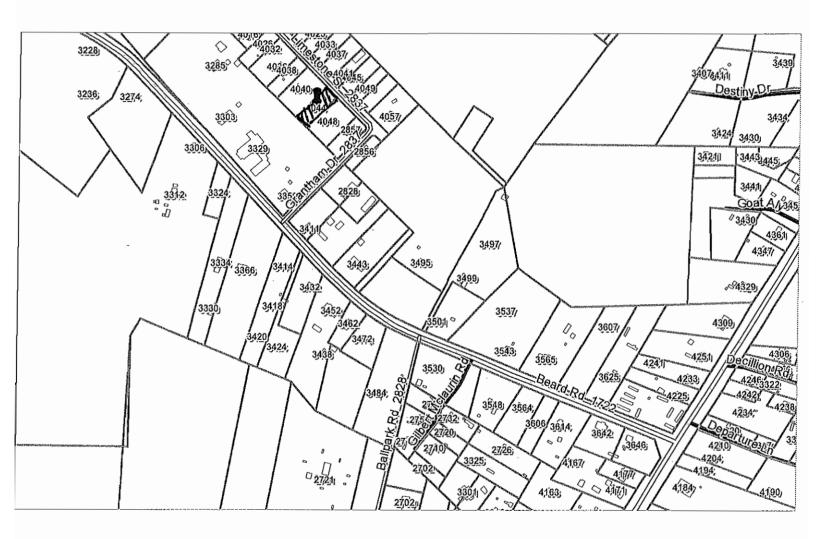

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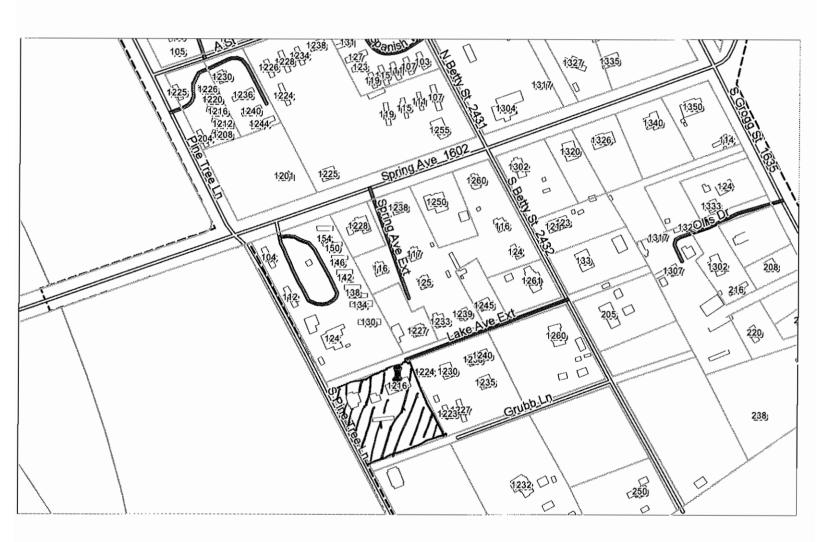

No one attended the Hearing. It was ordered that the structure be repaired to a minimum standard for human habitation, or be demolished and the debris removed from the premises by a date not later than <u>9/18/2009</u>. The property owners and parties of interest were notified of the appeal procedures when they were served with the <u>Findings of Fact and Order</u>. (See Exhibit A for Findings of Fact and Order.) No appeal was filed. Upon my visit to the property on <u>11/10/2009</u> no corrective action had been made to the structure. The structure is presently vacant and reasonably secured. ALLOCATION OF RECOVERY ZONE FACILITY BONDS

BACKGROUND

Cumberland County received an allocation of \$1.7M of Recovery Zone Facility Bonds (RZFB's). These instruments were authorized as part of the American Recovery Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009. Below are some of the requirements and characteristics related to this particular ARRA bond:

- Allows private sector to borrow at tax exempt rate.
- Typical issuer is the Industrial Facilities and Pollution Control Financing Authority.
- Must be issued in a designated recovery zone.
- Shall be used in any trade or business (other than residential rental property), which may include shopping centers, manufacturing, distribution/warehouse facilities, hotels, and office buildings.

The North Carolina Department of Commerce has been given administrative authority in this process, and accordingly, the following procedures have been identified:

- Counties and municipalities must designate (by resolution) projects to be financed with recovery zone bonds by December 15, 2009.
- If this designation is **not** made, the allocation will be deemed waived for reallocation by the State.
- Local governments can waive their allocation and request the State to reallocate it to another project in another governmental unit.
- Counties and municipalities must request (by resolution) their interest in an "additional allocation", specifically by project, by December 15, 2009.

Celebrating Our Past...Embracing Our Future

At the October Finance Committee Meeting, the Gentry Group, LLC made a presentation requesting designation of a portion of these funds for development of the Freedom Business Center in Spring Lake. The Gentry Group has requested \$1M of our initial allocation and \$17M in reallocated funds.

Another shovel ready project has been identified in Spring Lake. Kingdom Realty Holdings, LLC made a presentation at the November Finance Committee Meeting regarding their partnership with a private developer to construct a hybrid Hotel/Restaurant Model. A request has been made for \$700,000 of our \$1.7M allocation.

Additionally, the County received a letter from the Lower Cape Fear Water and Sewer Authority requesting the County to waive our initial \$1.7M allocation. At this time, Management recommends utilizing our entire allocation for shovel ready economic development projects within Cumberland County.

The Finance Committee unanimously approved the recommendation to prepare an application to the N.C. Department of Commerce requesting a designation of our initial allocation to the Gentry Group, LLC in the amount of \$1M and the remaining \$700,000 to the Kingdom Realty Holdings, LLC. Additionally, the Committee agreed on submitting an application for an additional designation of RZFB's up to \$17M for further development of the Freedom Business Center by the Gentry Group, LLC. A draft copy of the minutes of the Finance Committee meeting is attached.

RECOMMENDATION

Management recommends the following:

- 1. Approval of the attached resolution which formally designates these project areas in Spring Lake as Recovery Zone Property and authorizes the County Manager to sign the necessary documents which will be submitted to the North Carolina Department of Commerce.
- 2. Approval designating an initial allocation of RZFB's to the Gentry Group, LLC in the amount of \$1M and the remaining \$700,000 to Kingdom Realty Holdings, LLC.
- 3. Approval to submit an application for an additional allocation up to \$17M for further development of Freedom Business Center, by the Gentry Group, LLC.

Commissioner Edge called the meeting to order and asked Commissioner Blackwell to open the meeting with a prayer.

Commissioner Edge stated that a Closed Session for Economic Development under NCGS 143-318.11 (a)(4) has been requested by the County Manager to be added to the agenda.

MOTION: Commissioner Blackwell moved to approve the addition to the agenda.

SECOND: Commissioner Keefe

2. Consideration of Designating the County's \$1.7M Allocation of Recovery Zone Facility Bonds

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County Manager Martin re minded attendees that at the last meeting of the Finance Committee, the Gentry Group requested \$1.7M of the County's recovery zone facility bonds (RZFB) and Carl Manning with the Kingdom Community Development Corporation was also present at that meeting, but the request now is for dividing the allocation between the two groups - \$1M to the Gentry Group and \$700,000 to the Kingdom Realty Holdings, LLC. Mrs. Cannon explained that there is a requirement on the RZFB which requires that an application be submitted to the Department of Commerce by December 15, 2009 for each project for the initial allocation of \$1.7M, with an opportunity of a reallocation of additional funds which requires an application by December 15, 2009. Therefore, a request would need to go forward to the full Board on November 16 in order to meet this deadline. Mr. Martin added that the possibility of an additional allocation would be in the amount of \$17M and that a further request will be brought to the Board on November 16 in that amount for the Gentry Group with a caveat that it is contingent upon satisfactory completion of a due diligence process to include the determination of credit worthiness. Commissioner Edge questioned whether Mrs. Cannon had received the State guidelines regarding these bonds and she responded that she had and that the bonds must be issued by April 15, 2010. Commissioner Keefe questioned the County's exposure and whether the County would be liable in the event that these groups folded. Ms. Cannon explained that this is not a debt in the County's name as it would be a liability of the private corporations and that the County would not be held liable.

Mr. Manning gave a power point presentation on an Overview of Spring Lake Mixed-Use Retail Development Project. He provided information on their mission statement and organizational chart. The presentation also highlighted the impact on two projects with a combined yearly tax amount of \$29,500. The mixed-use retail development would include Candlewood Suites and IHOP Restaurant and information was provided on both businesses. A project overview was included showing a total project cost, including all predevelopment, would be \$9M on 2.2 acres of land. Funding in the amount of \$7,845,000 has been secured for the project. The total cost of the project is \$8,545,000 which leaves a gap in funding of \$700,000. Ms. Chisolm assured members that all funding sources have been secured except for the gap amount. Mr. Manning concluded the presentation with a project summary pointing out that this is a very strong project. Discussion ensued regarding the difference in this project from other projects that the Commissioners have approved for economic development.

Mr. Stafford gave an update on information that was provided at the last meeting stating that the request that is being made today is \$1M of the \$1.7M that exists and then an additional amount of future reallocations which Mr. Martin spoke of earlier. The Spring Lake Board of Alderman recently sanctioned an Economic Development Commission which he, Mr. Keim and Mr. Manning are serving on. A meeting will be held this afternoon to finalize funds for a master plan for the development and re-development of Spring Lake as a whole which has happened through efforts of the North Carolina Initiative, the BRAC Commission and Spring Lake. All tracts of land in the Business Center are under contract, with water, sewer, and roads all in place. The number one building in the park will be completed in early 2010 and will be occupied. There are

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expectations for the park to be a defense contractor park in its entirety. Mr. Stafford explained the duties of other members of the group which were present in the meeting, concluding his presentation with his assurance that the land is secure and the team is in place to finish the project.

MOTION: Commissioner Blackwell moved to recommend designation of the County's initial \$1.7M allocation – as follows - \$1M to the Gentry Group and \$700,000 to Kingdom Realty Holdings, LLC and further requesting a reallocation of up to \$17M of reallocated funds contingent upon a satisfactory completion of a due diligence process, to include a determination of credit worthiness.

DISCUSSION: County Manager Martin informed members that designation of the actual footprint of the recovery zone will need to be included as part of the action when presented at the November 16th full board meeting. Commissioner Keefe asked for an explanation of the reallocation funds mentioned and County Manager Martin explained that it is made up of funds that are not used by other counties and cities. Discussion ensued regarding how the funds are allocated and how counties can issue a resolution to request that their funds, if not used, be reallocated to another county for a particular project.

WHEREAS, on February 17, 2009, the President signed into law the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, Pub. L. No. 111-5 Stat. 115 (2009 ("ARRA"); and

WHEREAS, Section 1401 of Title I of Division B of ARRA authorizes state and local governments to issue Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds and Recovery Zone Facility Bonds; and

WHEREAS, Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds may be used to finance certain "qualified economic development purposes" and Recovery Zone Facility Bonds may be use to finance certain "recovery zone property," as such terms are defined in ARRA; and

WHEREAS, the term "Recovery Zone" means: 1) any area designated by the issuer as having significant poverty, unemployment, a high rate of home foreclosures or general distress; 2) any area designated by the issuer as economically distressed by reason of the closure or realignment of a military installation pursuant to the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990, and 3) any area for which a designation as an empowerment zone or renewal community is in effect as of the effective date of ARRA, which effective date is February 17, 2009; and

WHEREAS, this matter was discussed at the November 9, 2009 meeting of the Cumberland County Finance Committee and recommended to the full governing body for approval;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Cumberland County, NC governing body designates the areas more fully described above/attached as Exhibit A as a Recovery Zone; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT, the governing board authorizes the County Manager to sign the necessary documents and hereby allocates its volume cap of \$1,707,000 of Recovery Zone Facility Bonds to the Gentry Group, LLC in the amount of \$1,000,000 for development of the Freedom Business Center (the "Project") in Spring Lake and \$700,000 to Kingdom Realty Holdings, LLC for development of a combined hotel/restaurant franchise (the "Project"); and further that the County Manager is authorized to sign the necessary documents to request a further reallocation of Recovery Zone Facility Bonds from the North Carolina Tax Reform Allocation Committee in an amount up to \$17,000,000 to the Gentry Group, LLC for further development of the Freedom Business Center.

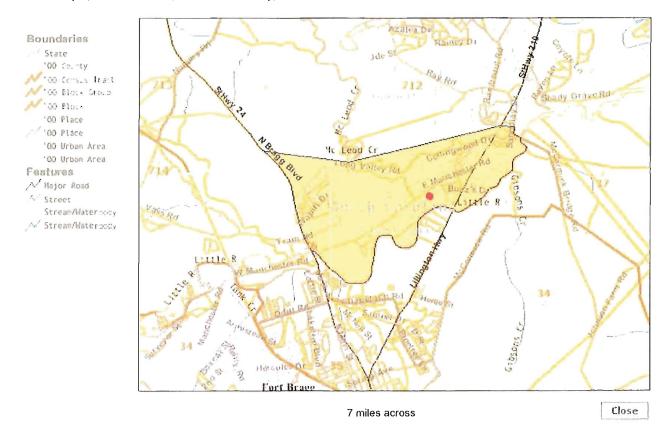

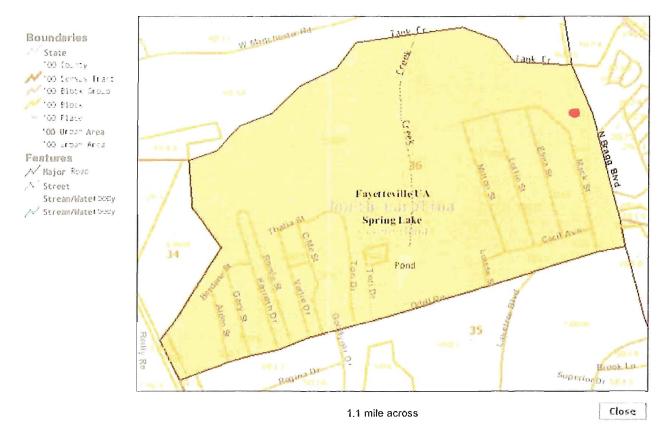

RECOVERY ZONE FACILITY BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$30M

BACKGROUND

The Chamber of Commerce has been approached by a private developer who is interested in the concept of a franchise four-star hotel and restaurant attached to the Crown Center. This firm has conducted a market analysis to determine the viability of a hotel/restaurant partnership with the Crown Coliseum.

The developer is asking the County for approximately 4.5 acres of land on the Crown complex through a long-term lease and participation in the cost of a bridge connection to the Crown Center. Additionally, the private developer is seeking issuance of non-liability bond debt. It has been determined that an avenue for meeting this need could be through the Recovery Zone Facility Bonds (RZFB's). We have already designated our initial allocation of \$1.7M, but we have the opportunity to seek a further reallocation. These bonds allow a private developer to issue low interest tax-exempt debt. This would not be an obligation of the County.

Up to this point, this has been considered only as a potential economic development project that the Chamber has discussed with Management. This project is dependent upon the issuance of some type of non-liability bonds. Management realizes there are many other issues to be considered, but we feel that exploring a reallocation of RZFB's is the first step.

RECOMMENDATION

The Chamber President and county management recommends the filing of an application to the NC Department of Commerce requesting a reallocation of RZFB's in the amount of \$30M for the proposed hotel/restaurant project at the Crown Coliseum. A resolution is attached which formally designates this project as being in a Recovery Zone and authorizes the County Manager to sign the necessary documents which request a further reallocation.

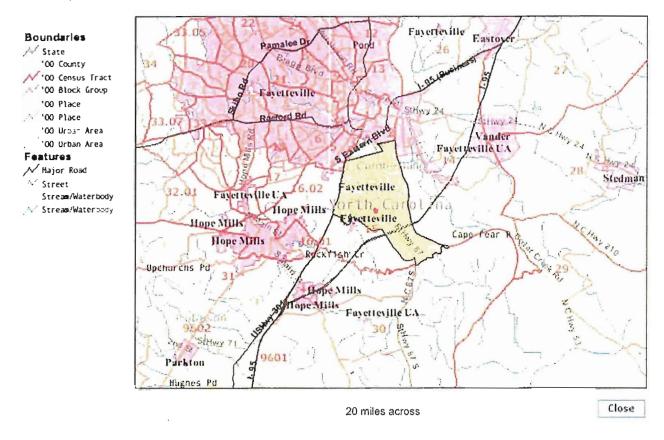

CONSIDERATION OF DESIGNATING THE COUNTY'S \$1.1 MILLION

ALLOCATION OF RECOVERY ZONE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT BONDS

BACKGROUND

In February 2005, staff presented to the County Facilities Committee a list of capital improvement projects for the Crown Arena and Theater. Refer to the attached memorandum. The list included short-term projects which were subsequently addressed in the Theater Lobby Renovation Project constructed in 2006 and long-term projects yet to be undertaken. Of the long-term projects, upgrading the mechanical, electrical, plumbing and life safety (fire alarm) systems is the top priority.

In May 2009, LSV Partnership was authorized to conduct an evaluation of the MEP systems in the Arena and Theater which are essentially the original building systems constructed in 1967. The mechanical system does not meet the indoor air quality standards in the current building code and is not energy efficient. The original cooling tower was replaced in 2001 with a used tower which is in a state of disrepair. The main electrical switchgear and panels were manufactured by Federal Pacific which is no longer in business and replacement parts are difficult to locate and expensive. Electrical distribution is a two-wire system with no ground and is no longer code compliant. The plumbing system contains galvanized steel water piping which needs to be replaced. About 80% of the plumbing fixtures need to be replaced. The life safety system (fire alarm) is virtually non-existent and the Inspections Department will not allow any additional renovations to the building without upgrading the life safety system.

A presentation of the Crown Arena and Theater MEP Study was made to the Crown Center Civic Center Commission at its October 27, 2009 meeting and subsequently to the County Facilities Committee at its November 10, 2009 meeting. A copy of the power point presentation is attached. The conditions of the existing systems were reviewed and recommended upgrades discussed. The recommended mechanical system includes three (3) 200-ton air cooled screw chillers coupled with ice storage tanks to provide cooling. This is a very energy efficient system and the increased capital costs over a conventional chiller/cooling tower system will be recovered in reduced energy costs within two years based on assumed usage of the facility. New air handling units would be installed for air distribution. The mechanical system would be configured to isolate each venue so that the entire system would not need to operate if there is only an event in either the Arena or Theater. A new mechanical room located on the north side of the Theater is proposed to house the new pumps, chillers and controls. The ice storage tanks will be located outdoors adjacent to the new mechanical room and screened from view. The boiler that provides building heat was replaced in 2001 and is in good condition. New electrical switchgear, panels and circuits (3-wire) are proposed. A new fire alarm system will be installed as required by the building code officials. New water lines will be installed, plumbing fixtures replaced as needed, and one sewerage lift station replaced.

The preliminary project cost estimate including design fees and contingencies is \$3.85 Million. The proposed project schedule was also discussed. Assuming the project is approved, design will begin immediately with a tentative bid date of early Spring 2010. Construction would take place during the Summer 2010. The facility would be closed for about 3 months.

The Crown Center Civic Center Commission unanimously endorsed the project and recommended forwarding it to the County Facilities Committee for its consideration.

The County Facilities Committee, after discussion, unanimously endorsed the project and recommended forwarding it to the Board of Commissioners for its consideration. A copy of the Draft Facilities Committee Minutes are attached.

FUNDING CONSIDERATIONS

The County received an allocation of \$1,138,000 of Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds (RZEDB's). These instruments were authorized as part of the American Recovery Reinvestment Act (ARRA). These are similar to the Recovery Zone Facility Bonds (RZFB's) except, they are limited to expenditures for public infrastructure and construction of public facilities. These instruments include a refundable credit of 45% of the amount of interest paid on each payment date.

County Management recommends the filing of an application to the North Carolina Department of Commerce requesting that our \$1.1M allocation of RZEDB's be designated for these upgrades at the Crown Arena and Theater. Following the same process as the RZFB's, a determination must be made that this project is within a recovery zone and an application must be filed with the Department of Commerce by December 15, 2009.

Food and Beverage Tax funds will be used to fund project costs that exceed the \$1.1M. Sufficient funds are available in the Food and Beverage Fund Balance.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION

The recommendation of the County Facilities Committee, Crown Center Civic Center Commission, County Engineer and management is to approve the Crown Arena and Theater Mechanical, Electrical, Plumbing and Life Safety Improvement Project and instruct staff to proceed with the design work.

The recommendation of County Management is to approve the attached resolution which formally designates this project as being in a Recovery Zone and authorizes the County Manager to sign the necessary documents which designate our \$1.1M allocation of RZEDB's for the Crown Theater and Arena Upgrades.

The proposed action by the Board is to follow the staff recommendations.

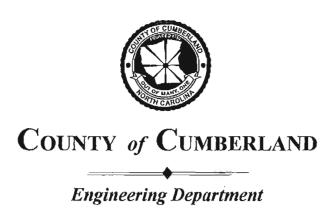
On October 27, 2009, the Civic Center Commission Board unanimously endorsed a plumbing, mechanical, and electrical upgrade proposal for the Crown Center Theatre and Arena. The proposal was prepared and presented by the Cumberland County Engineering Department in conjunction with Mr. Walter Vick and Mr. Hank Hoomani.

The proposal and presentation is clear and informative. It specifically outlines the priority of needed repairs and provides an analysis of costs based on each system. The Civic Center Commission Board members were uniformly supportive of the request to proceed with the repairs and appreciative of the extensive background information and equipment specification details provided by the Engineering Department.

The proposal outlines the necessary upgrades to the existing 40-year old system currently in place at the Theatre and Arena. A previous comprehensive evaluation of needs was performed and verified that the existing systems are inadequate, costly to operate, and extremely deficient in compliance with current building and life safety codes. Parts of the system are in complete non-compliance and renovation permits cannot be obtained.

There is a definite urgency to proceed with the replacement and repairs to the current operating systems. Aside from the monetary savings that a newer, greener system would recognize, the loss of booking opportunities for these facilities also exists. Currently, events may or may not be contracted in these facilities based on weather conditions, occupant capacity of the adjoining facility, and the possibility of system failure. In an effort to minimize the loss of revenue that could ensue from a system failure during a contracted event, the Civic Center Commission Board feels that it is imperative that the upgrades are performed as soon as is possible.

A prior commitment has required my attendance at a meeting in Raleigh on November 10th. I sincerely regret that I was unable to attend the Committee meeting to personally support this proposal. SUBJECT: CROWN THEATER AND ARENA CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

BACKGROUND

The Engineering Department has been working with Coliseum management and LSV Partnership to develop a master plan for capital improvements to the Crown Theater and Arena that address both short-term and long-term needs of the facilities.

A presentation was made to the Civic Center Board on January 25, 2005, at which time the projects recommended by staff, as shown on the attached list "Crown Theater and Arena Capital Improvement Projects", were discussed in detail for their consideration. The list is divided into short-term projects, for which funding in concept has been endorsed by County Management and the Board of County Commissioners, and long-term projects which are recommended for inclusion in the 5-Year CIP for the Coliseum Complex.

A brief description of each project is as follows:

SHORT-TERM PROJECTS

Renovations to Theater Lobby and Mezzanine Concessions:

This involves cosmetic renovations to this space such as new wall and floor coverings, re-finishing the terrazzo stairs and handrails, new signage/graphics, new lighting fixtures, painting, etc. to modernize the space. In addition, there is existing storage space on the mezzanine level that would be converted into concessions and minor renovations in the restrooms. Estimated Cost = \$135,000.

Theater Lobby Atrium:

This involves removing a portion of the low roof and building a glass enclosure to create a spacious area that is more inviting to the patrons of the Theater. Attached is a conceptual scheme of what this area may look like. A portion of the existing exterior wall of the mezzanine lobby (balcony) would be removed to create a visual connection between the main lobby and balcony. Estimated Cost = \$200,000.

ADA Toilets and Concessions at Main Floor:

This involves converting the existing office/staff restroom core space in the main lobby connecting the Theater and Arena into new concessions and restrooms to serve each venue independently. When only one event is taking place in the complex, then the entire space is available to support that venue. Attached is a schematic plan showing the proposed renovations. Estimated Cost = \$330,000.

Arena Dressing Rooms and Lounge Renovations at Basement Level:

This involves converting existing storage/workroom space in the Arena Basement into new dressing rooms, both individual and choral, renovating an existing dressing room and lounge with new fixtures and finishes as shown on the attached schematic plan. In addition, a new exterior exit from the basement will be installed which has been requested by the County Fire Marshall's Office. The facility lacks adequate modern dressing rooms to support the events in the Arena and this renovation will address this need. Estimated Cost = \$330,000.

Structural Reinforcement of Arena Elevated Floor Slab:

This involves providing additional structural support for the elevated slab in the Arena. There are concerns regarding the structural integrity of the floor slab which will be addressed by this project. The new masonry walls to be constructed as part of the work described above will also provide additional structural support for the elevated floor slab. Estimated Cost = \$150,000.

Theater Stage ADA Lift:

This involves the installation of a chair lift installed at the Theater stage to provide ADA access to the stage for physically impaired persons. Estimated Cost = \$15,000.

LONG-TERM PROJECTS

Plumbing, Mechanical and Electrical Systems Upgrade:

The facility is approaching 40 years old without any major overhaul of the P,M&E systems. These systems are reaching their useful life and if the County desires to continue operating the Theater and Arena, major upgrades will be required. New energy efficient mechanical and electrical systems are needed throughout the facility. Budget Cost = \$3,000,000.

Theater and Stage Renovations:

This involves complete renovation of the Theater seating area to include new ceiling, wall coverings, floor finishes, new lighting, repair or replacement of seats, audio system improvements, etc. In addition there are improvements needed in the stage and "back of house" areas such as dressing rooms, restrooms, etc. Budget Cost = \$2,500,000.

Arena Renovations:

This involves complete renovation of the Arena to include repairs or replacement of the floor slab, locker room and concession upgrades, renovation of office and "green room", new wall finishes (painting), etc. Budget Cost = \$1,000,000.

New Pre-function Lobby and Elevator:

This involves construction of new space located on the parking lot side of the Theater/Arena that would serve as a new entrance into the facility. A conceptual plan and architectural rendering is

attached. The conceptual design mirrors the Crown Coliseum and architecturally ties the Crown Complex together. The space would provide additional concessions, restrooms and other support areas for the Theater and Arena including an elevator for ADA access to the mezzanine level. Budget Cost = \$2,500,000.

New Storage and Loading Dock Space (Theater):

This involves construction of new storage space and realigning the loading dock so that it is visually screened from the new entrance. Budget Cost = \$250,000.

Revisions/Screening at Arena Loading Dock:

This involves construction of new screen wall around the existing Arena loading dock. Budget Cost = \$20,000.

Adding contingencies and design fees, the total budget cost for the long-term projects is \$10,370,000.

The Civic Center Board approved a recommendation to forward the short-term projects to the County Facilities Committee for their consideration and approval and referred the long-term project list back to the Coliseum Facilities Committee for further study.

RECOMMENDATION

The recommendation of the Civic Center Board is to approve the list of short-term capital improvement projects and proceed with design and construction.

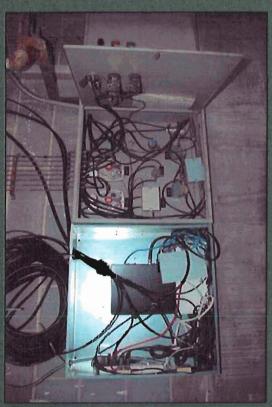
Existing Electrical System

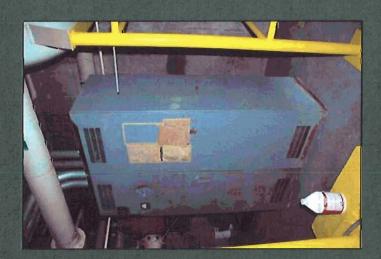




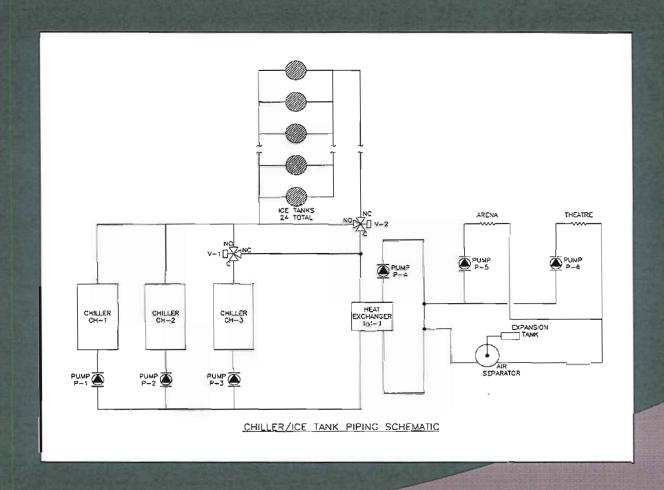
Existing Electrical System

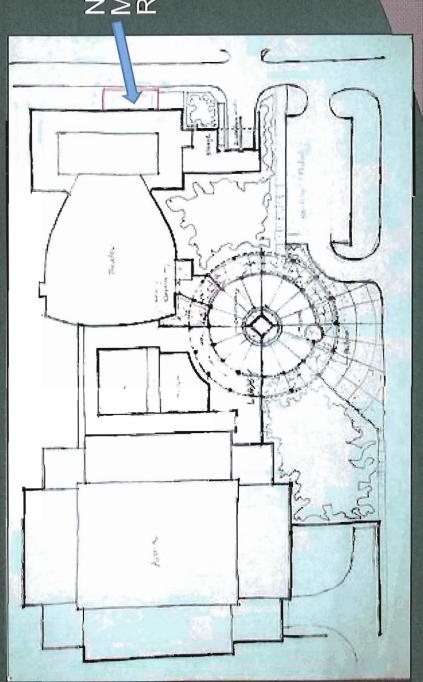

1. Approval of Minutes: September 8, 2009 Meeting

MOTION: Commissioner King moved to approve.

SECOND: Commissioner Keefe

VOTE: UNANIMOUS

2. Update on Phase II Improvements at Crown Arena and Theater – Mechanical, Electrical, Plumbing and Life Safety Upgrades

Commissioner Keefe called on James Martin, County Manager. Mr. Martin recognized the Civic Center Commission members in attendance and stated that the plumbing, mechanical and electrical upgrade proposal to be provided by Bob Stanger, County

Engineer, had received their support and recommendation for approval to the Facilities Committee.

Mr. Stanger referenced a memorandum dated February 2, 2005 as provided regarding the Crown Theater and Arena capital improvement short-term and long-term projects. Mr. Stanger advised the short-term projects were subsequently addressed in the Theater Lobby Renovation Project constructed in 2006 and the long-term projects identified as upgrading the mechanical, electrical, plumbing (MEP) and life safety systems have yet to be undertaken and are of top priority.

Mr. Stanger advised that in May 2009, LSV Partnership Architects/Planners was authorized to conduct an evaluation of the MEP systems, which were originally constructed in 1967. Mr. Stanger summarized MEP current conditions as follows:

- The mechanical system does not meet the indoor air quality standards in the current building code and is not energy efficient.
- The original cooling tower was replaced in 2001 with a used tower that is in a state of disrepair.
- The main electrical switchgear and panels were manufactured by a company that is no longer in business and replacement parts are difficult to locate and are expensive.
- The electrical distribution is a two-wire system with no ground and is no longer code compliant.
- The plumbing system contains galvanized steel water piping that needs to be replaced.
- Approximately 80% of the plumbing fixtures need to be replaced.
- The life safety system (fire alarm) is virtually non-existent and the Inspections Department will not allow any additional renovations to the building without upgrading the life safety system.

Mr. Stanger called on Walter Vick of LSV Partnership Architects/Planners and advised the same presentation being provided to the Facilities Committee had been provided to the Civic Center Commission in October 2009. Mr. Vick reported when the coliseum was completed, \$6 million was budgeted for upgrades to the facility but the funds were diverted to other coliseum projects with the exception of the replacement of rigging and lighting over the stage. Mr. Vick further reported there were three options following completion of the study: 1) shut the facility down, 2) continue to use the facility until it grinds to a halt due to multiple deficiencies, or 3) put the facility into a condition to be competitive in an entertaining environment so as to retain entertainment dollars for the county. Mr. Vick advised the third option was the direction elected.

Mr. Vick introduced Hank Hoomani of Progressive Design Collaborative, Ltd., who provided a summary report and presentation of the MEP Systems Study. Mr. Hoomani reported that the existing mechanical system is original to the facility and dates back to the late sixties or early seventies. Mr. Hoomani stated at the time of the design, the thought was that the arena and theater would not be operational at the same time; however, it has been difficult to maintain temperatures and humidity levels during the

past several years when they have operated simultaneously. Mr. Hoomani further stated due to certain refrigerates being outlawed by the federal government, costs to purchase refrigerates for the forty year old air chiller are approximately \$35,000. Mr. Hoomani stated the proposal is to replace the mechanical system using ice tanks to make ice at night and run water over the ice to chill it for use in cooling the building during the daytime. Mr. Hoomani explained the purpose of this type of system is to save energy through kilowatt hours as opposed to kilowatt demand.

Mr. Hoomani reported that 80% of the plumbing system needs to be replaced as it is forty years old and most of the piping is galvanized steel with reduced flow capacity. Mr. Hooman further reported that the existing water heater is in good shape but the storage tank needs to be replaced, most of the cast iron sanitary sewer system and roof drain are in good shape and can be used again; and one of the two sewage lift station pumps needs to be replaced.

Mr. Hoomani reported that complete replacement of the electrical distribution system is recommended because most of the equipment is outdated and the manufacturer has been out of business for a number of years, which makes it difficult and expensive to acquire breakers for the system.

Mr. Hoomani stated the preliminary cost estimates include: the MEP system - \$3 million; general construction costs - \$500,000; engineering design fee - 10%; and ice storage system additional cost - \$150,000. Mr. Hoomani further stated annual operating costs for a system without ice storage would be approximately \$164,000 and with ice storage as proposed would be approximately \$85,000, which includes assumptions for kilowatt hours and kilowatt demand charges. In conclusion, Mr. Hoomani stated total operating cost savings per year for a system with ice storage would be approximately \$79,000. Mr. Hoomani further stated the payback of the extra \$150,000 for ice storage tanks would be 1.9 years. Mr. Hoomani displayed a diagram of the new mechanical room location.

Mr. Stanger summarized as follows:

- A new fire alarm system will be installed as required by the building code officials.
- Assuming the project is approved, the design phase would begin immediately with a tentative bid date of early spring 2010; construction to take place during the summer of 2010; the facility would have to be closed for approximately three months, and although the total construction timeframe will take longer, exterior construction can continue after the facility is reopened.
- The Civic Center Commission unanimously endorsed the project and recommended forwarding to the Facilities Committee for further consideration.

Commissioner King inquired regarding what prompted the need for the MEP system upgrades. Mr. Stanger responded the condition of the infrastructure within the facility, which was forty years old, had met its service life. Mr. Stanger further responded that if the facility was going to continue to operate, the MEP system upgrades will have to be

done or the infrastructure will continue to deteriorate. Mr. Stanger provided additional details. Mr. Vick spoke to the need for a new fire alarm system.

Commissioner Keefe inquired regarding the funding source for the upgrades. Mr. Martin explained proposed funding is a combination of a \$1.1 million allocation from the federal stimulus funds of recovery zone economic bonds and if application is not made for the funds by December 15, 2009, they will revert back to the state and will be reallocated to another county or city. Mr. Martin further explained the county is also looking at additional energy grant funds. Mr. Martin stated the fallback will be food and beverage funds. Mr. Martin pointed out that in order for the county not to be put in a position to supplement federal funds or other types of fund, the intent is to first utilize the current allocation of \$1.1 million, seek additional energy grant funds or other federal funds that may be available to the county and then to supplement the balance.

In response to a question posed by Commissioner Keefe, Mr. Martin briefly spoke to facility bonds and economic development bonds. Amy Cannon, Assistant County Manager, explained the economic development bonds are restricted to public facilities and infrastructure.

Commissioner Keefe stated the arena is not running at full capacity and inquired whether the numbers as provided indicate any real savings. Commissioner Keefe further inquired regarding the number of times the arena was used during the past year. Chris Ragland, Civic Center Assistant General Manager, responded use for the arena and theater was between eighty and one hundred event days. Mr. Vick noted that capacity is reduced when the facility is not in use and with the ice storage system as proposed, capacity will be saved. Commissioner Keefe inquired about the number of times the arena and theater were used at the same time. Mr. Ragland stated the problem with the current system is that it is either all on or all off and there is always a risk that the system may fail either during or just prior to an event thereby creating a financial liability for the county. Mr. Ragland further stated he would gather figures on the number of multiple use days. Mr. Ragland noted another problem is that the current system can not be divided and the proposed system will allow for separation of the arena and theater, which will reduce operation costs.

Commissioner Keefe inquired regarding maintenance as budgeted and expressed concern that the funds might possibly be going towards an under-utilized system. Mr. Martin advised the proposal is to allow for the continued and expanded operation of the two facilities, otherwise the band-aided system could break down thereby placing the two facilities out of business for an unknown period of time. Mr. Martin stated although he understood and shared some of Commissioner Keefe's concern, the situation is somewhat different in that food and beverage funds can only be used for coliseum purposes. Mr. Martin further stated the county generally attempts to keep the financial operations of the crown coliseum entirely separate from the general fund since the coliseum operates under an enterprise fund. Mr. Martin further explained the budget for maintenance is under the general fund, which could only be used on an emergency basis with the Commissioner's authority.

Commissioner King asked Mr. Martin for his recommendation. Mr. Martin responded his recommendation was to recommend the project to the Commissioners with the funding sources as outlined: economic development recovery bonds; seeking of other energy grant funds; food and beverage funds as back up or the final source.

MOTION: Commissioner King moved for the Facilities Committee to approve the

update for the Phase II improvements to the Crown Arena and Theater

mechanical, electrical and plumbing and life safety upgrades.

SECOND: Commissioner Keefe

Commissioner Keefe requested hard numbers for use of the arena and theater. Commissioner King stated that his understanding was that the project had to move forward in order to continue to do business. Commissioner Keefe stated the question in this situation is whether the county wants to continue to invest when the venues are not out there and when the utilization is not out there. Commissioner King stated that if something is not done, nothing can be done in terms of offering prospects and opportunities.

Commissioner Edge stated a tremendous investment of approximately \$1.3 million has already been made in the facility by keeping it open and the current system is being bandaided, which has also incurred costs over the years.

Harvey Raynor, Interim County Attorney, spoke to liability associated with the fire alarm/ safety issue. Mr. Martin emphasized that during performance events, the county has staff and sheriff deputies serving as watchmen for fire/life safety purposes.

Commissioner Keefe inquired when the item would go before the full board. Mr. Martin responded on Monday, November 16, 2009.

3. Follow-Up to Policy Committee Discussion Regarding Consideration of Request of Twelfth Judicial District Bar Association to Place a Plaque in the Courthouse to Commemorate the Service of the Lawyers Who Have Served as President of the Twelfth Judicial District Bar

Mr. Raynor advised that H. Terry Hutchens, current president of the Twelfth Judicial District Bar Association, has requested on behalf of the Bar Association to be allowed to place plaques on the wall of the courthouse to recognize and commemorate past Bar presidents. Mr. Raynor further advised the Bar has requested that the plaques be located on the third floor behind the courtrooms and has offered to be responsible for the cost of purchase and installation. Mr. Raynor explained the Twelfth Judicial District Bar is made up of all lawyers who live in and/or practice in Cumberland County.

J. Scott Flowers, Hutchens, Senter and Britton PA, provided additional information and responded to questions regarding the Twelfth Judicial District Bar, the Cumberland County Bar Association and the North Carolina Bar Association.

In response to a question posed by Commissioner Keefe, Mr. Stanger stated the county would not incur any maintenance costs.

Mr. Stanger stated original plans were to have a driveway cut; however, without a curb cut on Peace Street for traffic to enter/exit the parking area, traffic will have to circle around the facility.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY, NC Recovery Zonc Designation and Authorization to Appropriate Bond Issuance

WHEREAS, on February 17, 2009, the President signed into law the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, Pub. L. No. 111-5 Stat. 115 (2009 ("ARRA"); and

WHEREAS, Section 1401 of Title I of Division B of ARRA authorizes state and local governments to issue Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds and Recovery Zone Facility Bonds; and

WHEREAS, Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds may be used to finance certain "qualified economic development purposes" and Recovery Zone Facility Bonds may be use to finance certain "recovery zone property," as such terms are defined in ARRA; and

WHEREAS, the term "Recovery Zone" means: 1) any area designated by the issuer as having significant poverty, unemployment, a high rate of home foreclosures or general distress; 2) any area designated by the issuer as economically distressed by reason of the closure or realignment of a military installation pursuant to the Defense Base Closure and Realignment Act of 1990, and 3) any area for which a designation as an empowerment zone or renewal community is in effect as of the effective date of ARRA, which effective date is February 17, 2009; and

WHEREAS, Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds are considered "qualified" bonds for purposes of Section 6431 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and provide for a federal subsidy through a refundable tax credit paid to State or local governmental issuers in an amount equal to 45 percent of the total coupon interest payable to investors in these taxable bonds; and

WHEREAS, the interest on State or local Recovery Zone Facility Bonds is excludable from gross income for Federal income tax purposes; and

WHEREAS, Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds and Recovery Zone Facility Bonds must be issued before January 1, 2011; and

WHEREAS, Cumberland County, NC has received the following volume caps of:

Recovery Zone Economic Development Bonds: \$1,138,000 Recovery Zone Facility Bonds: \$1,707,000

and may use such volume cap for eligible costs or may allocate such volume cap in any reasonable manner as the Cumberland County, NC governing body shall determine in good faith at their discretion for use for eligible costs for qualified economic development purposes or recovery zone property; and

WHEREAS the Cumberland County, NC governing body seeks to designate the following area as a Recovery Zone due to significant levels of increased unemployment, increased levels of home foreclosures, and the general increase of economic distress throughout the county: CENSUS TRACT 15, BLOCK GROUPS 1; (see Exhibit A for supporting documentation) and

WHEREAS, this matter was discussed at the November 10, 2009 meeting of the Cumberland County Facilities Committee and recommended to the full governing body for approval;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Cumberland County, NC governing body designates the areas more fully described above/attached as Exhibit A as a Recovery Zone; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT, the governing body hereby allocates its \$1,138,000 in Recovery Zone Economic Development Bond allocation for its Crown Theater and Arena Upgrades (the "Project") and authorizes the County Manager to sign the necessary documents.

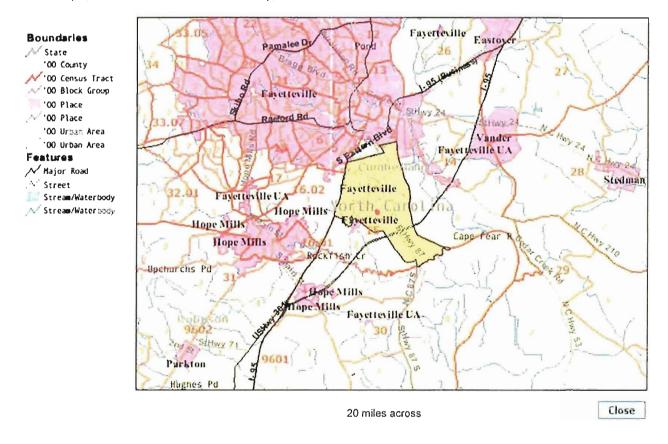

- The plumbing system contains galvanized steel water piping that needs to be replaced.
- Approximately 80% of the plumbing fixtures need to be replaced.
- The life safety system (fire alarm) is virtually non-existent and the Inspections Department will not allow any additional renovations to the building without upgrading the life safety system.

Mr. Stanger called on Walter Vick of LSV Partnership Architects/Planners and advised the same presentation being provided to the Facilities Committee had been provided to the Civic Center Commission in October 2009. Mr. Vick reported when the coliseum was completed, \$6 million was budgeted for upgrades to the facility but the funds were diverted to other coliseum projects with the exception of the replacement of rigging and lighting over the stage. Mr. Vick further reported there were three options following completion of the study: 1) shut the facility down, 2) continue to use the facility until it grinds to a halt due to multiple deficiencies, or 3) put the facility into a condition to be competitive in an entertaining environment so as to retain entertainment dollars for the county. Mr. Vick advised the third option was the direction elected.

Mr. Vick introduced Hank Hoomani of Progressive Design Collaborative, Ltd., who provided a summary report and presentation of the MEP Systems Study. Mr. Hoomani reported that the existing mechanical system is original to the facility and dates back to the late sixties or early seventies. Mr. Hoomani stated at the time of the design, the thought was that the arena and theater would not be operational at the same time; however, it has been difficult to maintain temperatures and humidity levels during the

past several years when they have operated simultaneously. Mr. Hoomani further stated due to certain refrigerates being outlawed by the federal government, costs to purchase refrigerates for the forty year old air chiller are approximately \$35,000. Mr. Hoomani stated the proposal is to replace the mechanical system using ice tanks to make ice at night and run water over the ice to chill it for use in cooling the building during the daytime. Mr. Hoomani explained the purpose of this type of system is to save energy through kilowatt hours as opposed to kilowatt demand.

Mr. Hoomani reported that 80% of the plumbing system needs to be replaced as it is forty years old and most of the piping is galvanized steel with reduced flow capacity. Mr. Hooman further reported that the existing water heater is in good shape but the storage tank needs to be replaced, most of the cast iron sanitary sewer system and roof drain are in good shape and can be used again; and one of the two sewage lift station pumps needs to be replaced.

Mr. Hoomani reported that complete replacement of the electrical distribution system is recommended because most of the equipment is outdated and the manufacturer has been out of business for a number of years, which makes it difficult and expensive to acquire breakers for the system.

Mr. Hoomani stated the preliminary cost estimates include: the MEP system - \$3 million; general construction costs - \$500,000; engineering design fee - 10%; and ice storage system additional cost - \$150,000. Mr. Hoomani further stated annual operating costs for a system without ice storage would be approximately \$164,000 and with ice storage as proposed would be approximately \$85,000, which includes assumptions for kilowatt hours and kilowatt demand charges. In conclusion, Mr. Hoomani stated total operating cost savings per year for a system with ice storage would be approximately \$79,000. Mr. Hoomani further stated the payback of the extra \$150,000 for ice storage tanks would be 1.9 years. Mr. Hoomani displayed a diagram of the new mechanical room location.

Mr. Stanger summarized as follows:

- A new fire alarm system will be installed as required by the building code officials.
- Assuming the project is approved, the design phase would begin immediately with a
 tentative bid date of early spring 2010; construction to take place during the summer
 of 2010; the facility would have to be closed for approximately three months, and
 although the total construction timeframe will take longer, exterior construction can
 continue after the facility is reopened.
- The Civic Center Commission unanimously endorsed the project and recommended forwarding to the Facilities Committee for further consideration.

Commissioner King inquired regarding what prompted the need for the MEP system upgrades. Mr. Stanger responded the condition of the infrastructure within the facility, which was forty years old, had met its service life. Mr. Stanger further responded that if the facility was going to continue to operate, the MEP system upgrades will have to be

done or the infrastructure will continue to deteriorate. Mr. Stanger provided additional details. Mr. Vick spoke to the need for a new fire alarm system.

Commissioner Keefe inquired regarding the funding source for the upgrades. Mr. Martin explained proposed funding is a combination of a \$1.1 million allocation from the federal stimulus funds of recovery zone economic bonds and if application is not made for the funds by December 15, 2009, they will revert back to the state and will be reallocated to another county or city. Mr. Martin further explained the county is also looking at additional energy grant funds. Mr. Martin stated the fallback will be food and beverage funds. Mr. Martin pointed out that in order for the county not to be put in a position to supplement federal funds or other types of fund, the intent is to first utilize the current allocation of \$1.1 million, seek additional energy grant funds or other federal funds that may be available to the county and then to supplement the balance.

In response to a question posed by Commissioner Keefe, Mr. Martin briefly spoke to facility bonds and economic development bonds. Amy Cannon, Assistant County Manager, explained the economic development bonds are restricted to public facilities and infrastructure.

Commissioner Keefe stated the arena is not running at full capacity and inquired whether the numbers as provided indicate any real savings. Commissioner Keefe further inquired regarding the number of times the arena was used during the past year. Chris Ragland, Civic Center Assistant General Manager, responded use for the arena and theater was between eighty and one hundred event days. Mr. Vick noted that capacity is reduced when the facility is not in use and with the ice storage system as proposed, capacity will be saved. Commissioner Keefe inquired about the number of times the arena and theater were used at the same time. Mr. Ragland stated the problem with the current system is that it is either all on or all off and there is always a risk that the system may fail either during or just prior to an event thereby creating a financial liability for the county. Mr. Ragland further stated he would gather figures on the number of multiple use days. Mr. Ragland noted another problem is that the current system can not be divided and the proposed system will allow for separation of the arena and theater, which will reduce operation costs.

Commissioner Keefe inquired regarding maintenance as budgeted and expressed concern that the funds might possibly be going towards an under-utilized system. Mr. Martin advised the proposal is to allow for the continued and expanded operation of the two facilities, otherwise the band-aided system could break down thereby placing the two facilities out of business for an unknown period of time. Mr. Martin stated although he understood and shared some of Commissioner Keefe's concern, the situation is somewhat different in that food and beverage funds can only be used for coliseum purposes. Mr. Martin further stated the county generally attempts to keep the financial operations of the crown coliseum entirely separate from the general fund since the coliseum operates under an enterprise fund. Mr. Martin further explained the budget for maintenance is under the general fund, which could only be used on an emergency basis with the Commissioner's authority.

Commissioner King asked Mr. Martin for his recommendation. Mr. Martin responded his recommendation was to recommend the project to the Commissioners with the funding sources as outlined: economic development recovery bonds; seeking of other energy grant funds; food and beverage funds as back up or the final source.

MOTION: Commissioner King moved for the Facilities Committee to approve the

update for the Phase II improvements to the Crown Arena and Theater

mechanical, electrical and plumbing and life safety upgrades.

SECOND: Commissioner Keefe

Commissioner Keefe requested hard numbers for use of the arena and theater. Commissioner King stated that his understanding was that the project had to move forward in order to continue to do business. Commissioner Keefe stated the question in this situation is whether the county wants to continue to invest when the venues are not out there and when the utilization is not out there. Commissioner King stated that if something is not done, nothing can be done in terms of offering prospects and opportunities.

Commissioner Edge stated a tremendous investment of approximately \$1.3 million has already been made in the facility by keeping it open and the current system is being bandaided, which has also incurred costs over the years.

Harvey Raynor, Interim County Attorney, spoke to liability associated with the fire alarm/ safety issue. Mr. Martin emphasized that during performance events, the county has staff and sheriff deputies serving as watchmen for fire/life safety purposes.

VOTE: UNANIMOUS

Commissioner Keefe inquired when the item would go before the full board. Mr. Martin responded on Monday, November 16, 2009.

3. Follow-Up to Policy Committee Discussion Regarding Consideration of Request of Twelfth Judicial District Bar Association to Place a Plaque in the Courthouse to Commemorate the Service of the Lawyers Who Have Served as President of the Twelfth Judicial District Bar

Mr. Raynor advised that H. Terry Hutchens, current president of the Twelfth Judicial District Bar Association, has requested on behalf of the Bar Association to be allowed to place plaques on the wall of the courthouse to recognize and commemorate past Bar presidents. Mr. Raynor further advised the Bar has requested that the plaques be located on the third floor behind the courtrooms and has offered to be responsible for the cost of purchase and installation. Mr. Raynor explained the Twelfth Judicial District Bar is made up of all lawyers who live in and/or practice in Cumberland County.

J. Scott Flowers, Hutchens, Senter and Britton PA, provided additional information and responded to questions regarding the Twelfth Judicial District Bar, the Cumberland County Bar Association and the North Carolina Bar Association.

In response to a question posed by Commissioner Keefe, Mr. Stanger stated the county would not incur any maintenance costs.

MOTION: Commissioner King moved to go forward and support the request to

provide space for the Bar to place the names of the leadership of their

organization.

SECOND: Commissioner Keefe

VOTE: UNANIMOUS

4. Status Report on New Public Health Center Construction

Mr. Stanger stated construction of the new Public Health Center began in June 2008 and the completion date in the original contract was November 10, 2009. Mr. Stanger further stated several change orders have been issued, which have extended the construction date to November 23, 2009; however, the contractor has been working diligently to meet the November 10, 2009 date. Mr. Stanger advised critical items to be completed are testing of the fire alarm system, elevator inspections, irrigation and landscaping, exterior railings, pouring a concrete pad at the dumpster location and minor interior finishes. Mr. Stanger noted owner provided furnishings and equipment are being purchased and workstations on the second and third floors are scheduled for delivery on November 9 and November 30, 2009. Mr. Stanger stated the county Information Services Department has begun installing the network equipment and the PWC has installed fiber optic cable in the building. Mr. Stanger further stated the Move Management Team met with the prospective movers to assist them with preparing their proposals for the move. Mr. Stanger stated expectations are for a Certificate of Occupancy (CO) to be issued early to mid December 2009.

Commissioner Keefe inquired when the public would have access to the facility. Mr. Martin responded in all likelihood in mid to late January 2010. Commissioner Keefe inquired regarding a public tour of the facility. Mr. Stanger stated that the Director of the Public Health Department mentioned a ribbon cutting or some type of ceremony for the opening of the facility.

Commissioner King inquired regarding parking for the facility. Mr. Raynor stated one of the properties has been obtained and there is no firm offer on the other property. Commissioner King asked how many additional parking spaces would be generated were the county to acquire all of the land up to Peace Street. Mr. Stander responded approximately one hundred to one hundred fifty additional spaces. Mr. Stanger stated should the county acquire the property and convert it for parking, there would not be a curb cut on Peace Street because a right turn lane on Ramsey Street would be required at a cost of approximately \$250,000. Mr. Stanger stated original plans were to have a driveway cut; however, without a curb cut on Peace Street for traffic to enter/exit the parking area, traffic will have to circle around the facility.

5. Other Matters of Concern

There were no other matters of concern.
