
























SITE MAP 538 & 505 MAYVIEW ST PEARCES MILL TOWNSHIP


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




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
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

















SITE MAP 710 WEISS AVE CROSS CREEK TOWNSHIP FAYETTEVILLE NC




Chris Manning has offered to purchase the property for \$1,886.45 and has deposited \$188.65 in the Finance Office. The tax value of the property is \$8,520.00.

- 6. It will operate and maintain the facility in accordance with the minimum standards as may be required or prescribed by the applicable Federal, State and local agencies for the maintenance and operation of such facilities.
- 7. It will give the grantor agency and the Comptroller General, through any authorized representative, access to and the right to examine all records, books, papers, or documents related to the grant.
- 8. It will require the facility to be designed to comply with the "American Standard Specifications for Making Buildings and Facilities Accessible to, and Usable by the Physically Handicapped," Number A117.1-1961, as modified (41 CFR 101-17-7031). The applicant will be responsible for conducting inspections to insure compliance with these specifications by the contractor.
- 9. It will cause work on the project to be commenced within a reasonable time after receipt of notification from the approving Federal agency that funds have been approved and will see that work on the project will be prosecuted to completion with reasonable diligence.
- 10. It will not dispose of or encumber its title or other interests in the site and facilities during the period of Federal interest or while the Government holds bonds, whichever is the longer.
- 11. It agrees to comply with Section 311, P.L. 93-288 and with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 83-352) and in accordance with Title VI of the Act, no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which the applicant receives Federal financial assistance and will immediately take any measures necessary to effectuate this agreement. If any real property or structure is provided or improved with the aid of Federal financial assistance extended to the Applicant, this assurance shall obligate the Applicant, or in the case of any transfer of such property, any transferee, for the period during which the real property or structure is used for a purpose for which the Federal financial assistance is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits.
- 12. It will establish safeguards to prohibit employees from using their positions for a purpose that is or gives the appearance of being motivated by a desire for private gain for themselves or others, particularly those with whom they have family, business, or other ties.
- 13. It will comply with the requirements of Title II and Title III of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisitions Act of 1970 (P.L. 91-646) which provides for fair and equitable treatment of persons displaced as a result of Federal and Federally assisted programs.
- 14. It will comply with all requirements imposed by the Federal grantor agency concerning special requirements of law, program requirements, and other administrative requirements approved in accordance with OMB Circular A-102, P.L. 93-288 as amended, and applicable Federal Regulations.
 - 15. It will comply with the provisions of the Hatch Act which limit the political activity of employees.
 - 16. It will comply with the minimum wage and maximum hours provisions of the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act, as they apply to hospital and educational institution employees of State and local governments.

- 17. (To the best of his/her knowledge and belief) the disaster relief work described on each Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Project Application for which Federal Financial assistance is requested is eligible in accordance with the criteria contained in 44 Code of Federal Regulations, Part 206, and applicable FEMA Handbooks.
- 18. The emergency or disaster relief work therein described for which Federal Assistance is requested hereunder does not or will not duplicate benefits received for the same loss from another source.
- 19. It will (1) provide without cost to the United States all lands, easements and rights-of-way necessary for accomplishments of the approved work; (2) hold and save the United States free from damages due to the approved work or Federal funding.
- 20. This assurance is given in consideration of and for the purpose of obtaining any and all Federal grants, loans, reimbursements, advances, contracts, property, discounts of other Federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to the Applicant by FEMA, that such Federal Financial assistance will be extended in reliance on the representations and agreements made in this assurance and that the United States shall have the right to seek judicial enforcement of this assurance. This assurance is binding on the applicant, its successors, transferees, and assignees, and the person or persons whose signatures appear on the reverse as authorized to sign this assurance on behalf of the applicant.
- 21. It will comply with the flood insurance purchase requirements of Section 102(a) of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973, Public Law 93-234, 87 Stat. 975, approved December 31, 1973. Section 102(a) requires, on and after March 2, 1975, the purchase of flood insurance in communities where such insurance is available as a condition for the receipt of any Federal financial assistance for construction or acquisition purposes for use in any area that has been identified by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency as an area having special flood hazards. The phrase "Federal financial assistance" includes any form of loan, grant, guaranty, insurance payment, rebate, subsidy, disaster assistance loan or grant, or any other form of direct or indirect Federal assistance.
- 22. It will comply with the insurance requirements of Section 314, PL 93-288, to obtain and maintain any other insurance as may be reasonable, adequate, and necessary to protect against further loss to any property which was replaced, restored, repaired, or constructed with this assistance.
- 23. It will defer funding of any projects involving flexible funding until FEMA makes a favorable environmental clearance, if this is required.
- 24. It will assist the Federal grantor agency in its compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended, (16 U.S.C. 470), Executive Order 11593, and the Archeological and Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (16 U.S.C. 469a-1 et seq.) by (a) consulting with the State Historic Preservation Officer on the conduct of investigations, as necessary, to identify properties listed in or eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic places that are subject to adverse effects (see 36 CFR Part 800.8) by the activity, and notifying the Federal grantor agency of the existence of any such properties, and by (b) complying with all requirements established by the Federal grantor agency to avoid or mitigate adverse effects upon such properties.
- 25. It will, for any repairs or construction financed herewith, comply with applicable standards of safety, decency and sanitation and in conformity with applicable codes, specifications and standards; and, will evaluate the natural hazards in areas in which the proceeds of the grant or loan are to be used and take appropriate action to mitigate such hazards, including safe land use and construction practices.

STATE ASSURANCES

The State agrees to take any necessary action within State capabilities to require compliance with these assurances and agreements by the applicant or to assume responsibility to the Federal government for any deficiencies not resolved to the satisfaction of the Regional Director.

2. PRESENTATION ON STATUS OF DETENTION CENTER EXPANSION **PROJECT**

Amy Cannon, Deputy County Manager, called on Bob Stanger, County Engineer, to provide information on the status of the Detention Center expansion project.

Mr. Stanger stated on January 25, 2012, the Detention Center Expansion Project Committee met with the Design Team and Construction Management Team to:

- Review the latest construction estimate prepared by Metcon-Balfour Beatty.
- Evaluate the list of value engineering (VE) items with associated cost reductions to determine those items acceptable to the committee. Several items were dismissed as unacceptable.
- Review the progress on the construction drawings and discuss the project schedule moving forward.

Mr. Stanger stated as previously reported to the Facilities Committee, the construction estimate of \$15,893,776 (subcontractor pricing) to \$16,652,812 (Balfour-Beatty in-house estimators) prepared by the Construction Manager at Risk (CMaR) in December 2011, exceeded the architect's construction estimate by \$2.9 million to \$3.6 million. Mr. Stanger further stated the Facilities Committee was also informed of the potential budget shortfall for the Detention Center expansion project as currently designed of between \$3.2 million and \$4.0 million when the owner's construction contingency and other "soft costs" are included.

Mr. Stanger stated the CMaR has continued to refine its construction estimate as additional subcontractor pricing is received and refinements to the design documents are provided by the architect. Mr. Stanger further stated the latest construction estimate is \$14,803,205 without considering any cost reductions for the VE items that have been identified to date. Mr. Stanger reported after a thorough review of the VE items by the Detention Center Expansion Project Committee, they were able to identify about \$1.35 million in cost reductions to bring the estimated construction cost to \$13,449,638. Mr. Stanger stated this brings the estimated project budget to approximately \$15,384,800 which still exceeds the budget established by the Board of Commissioners; however, the potential budget shortfall has been significantly reduced. Mr. Stanger further stated the Project Committee will continue to look for cost reduction opportunities.

Mr. Stanger stated the expectation of the Project Committee is to have the project bid in April 2012 and for construction to commence shortly thereafter.

Mr. Stanger introduced Doug Zawiskie, from Moseley Architect, and John Harris, from Balfour-Beatty, to give a quick overview and status report on the Detention Center expansion project. Mr. Zawiskie stated in order to implement the proposed changes from the CMaR, they are looking at (30) thirty days to make changes to the initial drawings and an additional (30) thirty days for state reviews.

Mr. Harris referenced the following projected progress summary as of February 2, 2012:

Questions and discussion followed. Mr. Harris stated the biggest discrepancy in the numbers is the level of detail in the drawings at this phase and as it continues to be refined, the numbers will come much closer together.

Earl "Moose" Butler, Sheriff, stated he and John McRainey, Detention Center Major/Chief Jailer, endorsed the project as it currently stands.

Ms. Cannon stated initially the construction schedule was anticipated to be sixteen (16) months which carried the project into fiscal year 2014 and included the collection of taxes dedicated to the project. Ms. Cannon further stated now that the construction schedule is thirteen (13) months, staff will need to go back to the drawing board since the county is cash-flowing the project. Ms. Cannon further stated the projected completion date of June 2013 will affect the capital costs and the operational costs, and she will work towards having information available at the Board's planning retreat.

Mr. Stanger stated the current budget contains \$540,000 for soft costs and some of that money will be used for furniture, furnishings and equipment (FF&E). Mr. Stanger also stated he would not recommend beginning any major construction project without the owner carrying some contingency and he is attempting to determine what amount of the budget can be allocated towards this. Mr. Stanger further stated he would like to hold 3% for this project and the construction manager is holding 2%, which in included in the budget numbers as presented.

Mr. Stanger stated at the request of the state, additional ground water samplings have been taken from monitoring wells established on the site and those samples have shown that there is an attenuation of the contaminants, particularly petroleum. Mr. Stanger also stated the numbers appear to be going down and the plume appears to be migrating to the southeast corner of the site. Mr. Stanger further stated the State Underground Storage Program is the lead agency on any remediation and has given the county two options: 1) the county can undertake the remediation, or 2) the county can ask the state to put this on their LEAD program for future remediation. Mr. Stanger stated he would recommend that the county ask the state to put this on their LEAD program. Mr. Stanger further stated measures to include the proper vapor barriers to prevent the migration of fumes have already been factored into the project. Consensus of the Facilities Committee was to ask the state to put on the remediation on their LEAD program.

3. APPROVAL OF BID AWARD TO BASS AIR CONDITIONING COMPANY – WINDING CREEK ANNEX HVAC RENOVATIONS (FORMER COMMUNICARE BUILDING)

Mr. Stanger advised the Winding Creek Annex was formerly occupied by the Communicare agency and the existing mechanical system and ductwork are in a state of major disrepair, can not be maintained as-is and needs to be replaced. Mr. Stanger also advised informal bids were taken in November 2011 and only one bid was received which was rejected on the basis of cost. Mr. Stanger further advised informal bids were again taken in January 2012 and the low bid was submitted by Bass Air Conditioning Company, Inc. in the amount of \$171,000. Mr. Stanger stated this bid was well within the preliminary estimate prepared by Progressive Design Collaborative, Ltd. (PDC) engineers and his recommendation along with the recommendation of PDC and county management is to award the bid to Bass Air Conditioning Company, Inc. along with a 5% contingency in the amount of \$8,550 for any additional work that may be recommended by either he or county management. Mr. Stanger called attention to the associated budget revision. Mr. Stanger responded to questions.

4. APPROVAL OF BID AWARD TO BASS AIR CONDITIONING COMPANY – FORMER PUBLIC HEALTH CENTER HVAC RENOVATIONS

Mr. Stanger advised informal bids were received on January 26, 2012 for demolition and replacement of the HVAC ductwork, the installation of new chilled and hot water lines, and variable air volume units to provide more efficient distribution of conditioned air on the first floor of the former Public Health building. Mr. Stanger explained this work is being done as part of the first floor renovations to the building for the Board of Elections offices and County Wellness Clinic and Pharmacy. Mr. Stanger stated the low bid was submitted by Bass Air Conditioning, Inc. in the amount of \$156,000, which was well within the preliminary estimate prepared by Progressive Design Collaborative, Ltd. Mr. Stanger further stated his recommendation along with the (PDC) engineers. recommendation of PDC and county management is to award the bid to Bass Air Conditioning Company, Inc. along with a 5% contingency in the amount of \$7,800. Mr. Stanger stated the purpose of the project is to provide for more efficient distribution of conditioned air within the facility which had been an ongoing problem in the facility. Mr. Stanger also stated this will reduce the cost to condition the first floor space. Mr. Stanger responded to questions.

Commissioner Keefe asked that an evaluation be conducted on the Board of Elections site for lease or sale should it no longer need to be used by the county. James Lawson, Assistant County Manager, explained the significant need the county has for office space for a training center and also for Veterans Services. Mr. Lawson stated because the office space is suitable for both, a decision was needed as to who could be relocated to the Board of Elections and who could be relocated to any space remaining in the former Public Health building. Mr. Lawson stated he would like to do whatever is in the best interest of internal staff and for the community, and he thought locating Veterans Services at the Board of Elections would have the greatest impact. Mr. Lawson also stated he wanted to follow the direction of the Board but he also wanted to make sure the Board was fully informed as to internal needs and the needs of the community. Questions and discussion followed.

6. OTHER MATTERS OF BUSINESS

Commissioner Jeannette Council broached the topic of meeting the needs of patients at the Health Department so they are not automatically referred to the hospital's emergency room. Commissioner Council stated she would refer the matter to the Finance Committee.

2. CONSIDERATION OF FAYETTEVILLE-CUMBERLAND COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE REQUEST REGARDING PRINCIPAL PAYMENTS ON THE SHELL BUILDING LOAN

Amy Cannon, Deputy County Manager, called on Doug Peters, President of the Fayetteville/Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce, for his request regarding the

principal payments on the shell building. Mr. Peters gave the Finance Committee the following information and recommendations:

HISTORY:

In 2001, the County of Cumberland and the former Fayetteville Area Economic Development Council (FAEDC) entered into a relationship that caused the FAEDC to build an industrial shell building of about 125,000 square feet, situated on roughly forty acres of land on Tom Starling Road.

The FAEDC merged with the former Chamber of Commerce in 2004 into the Cumberland County Business Council and was dissolved.

In 2008, the name of the Cumberland County Business Council was changed to the Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce.

The agreement between the Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce and the County of Cumberland was as follows:

The FAEDC constructed an unfinished "shell" building at a cost of roughly \$1,811,450.00 and had it financed through a consortium of banks in the community. At that time, the county agreed to back the loan, which for the last nine years has been interest only.

As specified in the agreement, the county pays the interest on the building on a monthly basis through the lead bank of the banking consortium. Currently, the amount the county pays annually is about \$100,000. This amount is paid directly to the lender.

In addition, the Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce pays the property taxes on the building, which is then reimbursed to the Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce by the county.

The Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce pays for insurance, utilities and maintenance of the building.

The Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce has served as fiscal agent for the building since its construction.

The Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce has served as the "for sale by owner" marketing representative on the property since inception by FAEDC.

STATUS:

The situation that exists today is that the consortium of banks, principally led by Capital Bank in Fayetteville, has experienced increasing regulatory pressure to add principal to the monthly interest-only payment. The

increasing regulatory structure is forcing a change in the structure requiring principal payments.

The existing interest-only loan has renewed annually for the last nine years.

It is customary for a commercial loan to require principal pay-down after one full year of interest only payments.

The Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce understands that the monthly principal payment will be in the neighborhood of \$7,000 monthly in addition to the interest payment.

The interest rate on the building has been 5 percent. The banks are suggesting that the rate go to 5.5 percent beginning this year.

This is a one-year loan, which is renegotiated each December and January and closed in February. This annual renewal adds additional cost.

By shifting to an amortized loan with interest and principal, the Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce believes that this will extend the term of the loan to at least three years, and perhaps five. This would reduce the amount of effort put on the financing portion of this agreement, allowing the time to be redirected to marketing.

The shell building itself sits on five acres that are considered integral to the shell building property. An additional 35 acres are available for eventual expansion or other use.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The county is being asked to pay the monthly principal amount in addition to the costs it currently incurs. The Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce will maintain its current cost burden (insurance, utilities, maintenance).

The Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce will attempt to negotiate the interest rate to something lower than 5.5 percent.

Mr. Peters reviewed the above information and stated the interest rate on the loan has been 5.5%; however, it may be possible to lower the interest rate one point going forward. Mr. Peters further stated with a fifteen-year amortization on the loan and an interest rate of 4.5% to 5.5%, the principal payment would be approximately \$6,400 a month in addition to the interest payment; the total payment would be approximately \$14,800 a month on a fifteen-year amortized note. Mr. Peters asked that the county to consider making the monthly principal amount in addition to the costs the county currently incurs.

Commissioner Edge inquired regarding a potential buyer for the shell building. Mr. Peters responded he had a verbal offer less than the asking price that he would present to the county

manager and the Board during a closed session. Mr. Peters advised there was a gap that would need to be filled, but it would get the building in production.

Discussion followed regarding documentation associated with the agreement and the financing portion therein. Commissioner Edge asked Mr. Peters whether the Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce could handle a reduction in their budget beginning July 1, 2012 should the county have to assume the \$14,800 a month for twelve months. Mr. Peters stated the Fayetteville-Cumberland County Chamber of Commerce would find a way to adjust, but it would affect the level of economic development service it could deliver. Additional discussion followed.

Ms. Cannon recommended that staff be permitted time to seek additional documentation to share with the Board at their February 6, 2012 meeting. Members of the Finance Committee concurred.

3. PRESENTATION OF AN OVERVIEW OF 2-1-1 IN NORTH CAROLINA

Amy Cannon, Deputy County Manager, called on Robert R. Hines, United Way of Cumberland County President and CEO, for an overview of 2-1-1 in North Carolina. The following information was made available to the Finance Committee members.

Mr. Hines reviewed the above information and reported that nationwide, 2-1-1 has been in existence for over ten years with 80% of both the nation and North Carolina on 2-1-1. Mr. Hines stated Cumberland County is the largest county between Delaware, Florida and the Tennessee border that does not have 2-1-1 due to cost issues. Mr. Hines stated antennas have been paid for and are in place in Cumberland County, and Blue Cross Blue Shield of North Carolina has agreed to handle downloading costs to connect individuals with community services.

Mr. Hines stated individuals are now calling Cape Fear Valley Hospital with basic needs, which is an important indicator that the county needs 2-1-1. Mr. Hines also stated Cape Fear Valley Hospital, the City of Fayetteville, the Public Works Commission, the United Way of North Carolina and Cumberland County, and the Women's Giving Circle have signed on to provide \$5,500 for the first year. Mr. Hines provided examples of how 2-1-1 calls would be handled and stated the call center in Chapel Hill will be able to translate any language. Mr. Hines reported one of the biggest advantages of 2-1-1 is that it will take pressure off of calls now going to 911 and Cape Fear Valley Hospital. Mr. Hines stated the kick-off will be the end of April or first of May 2012.

Questions followed. Consensus of the Finance Committee was to include the request as part of the upcoming budget process.

4. APPROVAL OF CUMBERLAND COUNTY PURCHASING ITEMS

The following information was made available to the Finance Committee members.

A. APPROVAL OF BI-DIRECTIONAL ANTENNA SYSTEM BIDS FOR HEALTH DEPARTMENT AND DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES

BACKGROUND:

The Finance Committee reviewed and approved a proposal to utilize the county's Emergency 911 Fund balance at the November 3, 2011 meeting. Additional material has been gathered and the following information provides a synopsis of the purpose for this equipment.

A Bi-Directional Antenna (BDA) system is an in-building wireless network designed to enhance coverage of the 800 MHz public safety radios and cellular signals. Most importantly, this BDA system will enable the county's public safety officers to maintain a signal on their 800 MHz radios in these buildings. Additionally, we will be able to receive a cell phone signal using county cell phones through the county's Verizon carrier in these buildings, which is needed especially during emergencies. The cost to expand the coverage to other cell phone carriers is significant.

Formal bids were received for the BDAs and the lowest bid meeting specifications was from Longent for \$115,250.24. This equipment will benefit both the Health Department and Social Services. The majority of the funds will come from 911 Fund Balance and a portion from the Health Department building fund.

RECOMMENDATION:

The purchasing manager and management are requesting that the bid for the Bi-Directional Antenna Systems be awarded to the lowest bidder, Longent, at \$115,250.24 and be forwarded to the Board of County Commissioners' February 6, 2012 meeting.

B. APPROVAL OF SOLE SOURCE PURCHASE/UPGRADE OF FIREHOUSE SOFTWARE

BACKGROUND:

The Finance Committee reviewed and approved a proposal to utilize the county's Emergency 911 Fund balance at the November 3, 2011 meeting. The Firehouse Software upgrade was one of many items on the approved list.

Currently the county's Information Technology (IT) Department houses and maintains the firehouse server and databases. The county's IT department will be upgrading the existing firehouse server to a web-based version and will be converting all firehouse databases which serve the Fire Marshal's office and all volunteer fire departments. Additionally, the City of Fayetteville fire departments will be combined with the county's server which will provide one consolidated system for centralized incident records, occupancy, and pre-plan data. Benefits include quicker, more accurate, and easier data entry which will improve emergency services to the community.

The quote for the cost of this software upgrade is \$184,114.19. The upgrade is requested under the sole source procurement since this is a licensed software solution which is only sold by Firehouse Software Company.

RECOMMENDATION:

The purchasing manager and management are requesting that the upgrade of our Firehouse Software be approved under sole source procurement.

Ms. Cannon reviewed the above information and advised a critical issue associated with the Health Department and the Department of Social Services buildings is that public safety officers are unable to access their 800 MHz public safety radios as well as their county-issued cell phones. Ms. Cannon explained with the BDA system, law enforcement officers will have radio and cell phone coverage.

Ms. Cannon stated the proposal for the sole source purchase is to upgrade the software dating back to 1996 or 1998 to a web-based version. Ms. Cannon further stated the upgrade is a licensed software solution and is only sold by Firehouse Software Company. Ms. Cannon responded to questions and stated under the circumstances, the software upgrade is the best solution to answer the public safety issue.

MOTION: Commissioner Council moved that the software upgrade be approved under sole

source procurement.

SECOND: Commissioner Edge

VOTE: UNANIMOUS (2-0)

Consensus of the Finance Committee was to forward purchasing Items 4.A. and 4.B. to the February 6, 2012 meeting of the full board for their consideration.

5. REVIEW OF MONTHLY FINANCIAL REPORT

Howard Abner, Assistant Finance Director, reported for expenditures and obligations, the first six months of the county's year-to-date obligations were 50.18% of budget. Mr. Abner stated the current spending rate would put year-end spending at around 96.3% versus 97% for the prior year.

Mr. Abner reported collections for ad valorem taxes were \$4.4 million above last year at this time but the budget was also \$3 million higher. Mr. Abner further reported the county was on track to collect about 101.6% of the budget compared to 100.5% last year. Mr. Abner stated once January's numbers are received, the county will have about 96% of its taxes. Mr. Abner reported sales taxes, which represent three out of twelve months, are slightly higher than last year but the budget was also increased.

Mr. Abner reported sales tax equalization dollars will begin showing up in March for payments received in January.

Mr. Abner called attention to Category 50-Register of Deeds and stated due to staff turn over, \$114,857 was posted to January instead of December and with that adjustment, December's revenue should be \$179,838. Mr. Abner reported the total for six months would then be \$864,749 and while this amount is slightly more than last year as a percentage of the budget, it is the same as the prior year. Mr. Abner reported Inspections Fees and Permits are lower than last year for the first six months. Mr. Abner stated the Register of Deeds and Inspections Fees and Permits indicate that the real estate and construction segments of the economy continue to struggle with growth. Mr. Abner reported the first seven categories in total are at 58.57% which is slightly above last year. Mr. Abner responded to questions.

Mr. Abner reported he has seen a lot of advertising for events at the Crown Coliseum but so far there has not been anything reflected in operating-income. Mr. Abner further reported operating expenses are down resulting in a lower operating cost than last year with a negative \$1.745 million versus a negative \$1.806 million. Mr. Abner stated when factoring in non-operating revenues and expenses, the first six months are a positive \$103,176 versus a very slight deficit last year.

6. OTHER MATTERS OF BUSINESS

With regard to community concerns, Commissioner Jeannette Council stated she would like to look at the Health Department facility and personnel to help alleviate some of the problems associated with the current community crisis in healthcare. Commissioner Council stated one of the problems is the number of individuals coming into the hospital emergency room and the fact that apparently personnel at the Health Department continuously send individuals to the hospital's emergency room. Commissioner Council stated this is a practice that she would like to see stopped because the emergency room should not be used as a primary care facility and there should be providers in the community to assist these individuals.

Commissioner Edge concurred with Commissioner Council and stated his understanding is that collaboration is underway with the heads of some of the agencies to attempt to resolve the problem or at least make it better. Commissioner Edge also stated non-profit agencies in the community can help reduce the numbers and perhaps offer better services.

The Finance Committee asked staff to follow up and bring a report to the March meeting of either the Policy Committee or the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Edge spoke briefly about the difference in the amount of inspections fees paid to the state and the amount reimbursed to counties, and the efforts of the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners (NCACC) and county health directors to look into the matter.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 11:05 a.m.



12th District Juvenile Court Profile for Fiscal Year 2010-11;

Over the 2010-11 fiscal year, 922 juveniles came through our office with complaints, down from 1154 in FY 10. This represents a 21% decrease compared to the previous fiscal year. The total number of complaints has decreased over the previous two fiscal years.

Of the 922 juveniles that came through our office, 441 were approved for court.


74 juveniles were diverted from court without further action. JCPC programs offer essential diversion alternatives to court. 441 juveniles were placed on a diversion plan or contract. These numbers along with diversions from court without further action indicate we are working with the families/children and trying to provide services without sending the juvenile/family to court. Instead of closing the matter out after the initial intake, the court counselor develops a plan or contract with the family and child. The plan is based upon information revealed during the intake. This could be from the risk assessment, needs assessment or dialogue between the family and court counselor. The plan or contract is time specific e.g.: 60 days or 6 months. If the juvenile/family completes the plan, the matter is then closed. If the juvenile/family fails to comply with the plan or contract, then the court counselor will take the complaint and enter a post diversion approval and file the complaint and make it a petition. A decrease came in the Youth Development Center (YDC) commitment numbers. The 2010 annual report reflected 32 commitments from Cumberland County. In FY 11, 28 youth were confined to a YDC. Cumberland still sends more youth on average compared to all other The number of youth bound over is increasing. Although the number of youth reported in the previous fiscal year was zero, we know that a minimum of 5 were either bound over or are in the process during this fiscal year. These youth commit serious felonies such as armed robbery, larcenies of motor vehicles, assault with a deadly weapon or other violent offenses.

Detention Center admissions from Cumberland County show the following trend:


517 admissions in 2008-2009 (Cost to Cumberland County- \$466,089.00)

484 admissions in 2009-2010. (Cost to Cumberland County- \$366,680.00)

374 admissions in 2010-2011. (Cost to the County- \$496,054.00) *The daily rate increased July 1, 2011. The county daily rate increased from \$89 to \$122 Historically, there have been many risk factors that have adversely affected youth and families in our community. Cumberland has evidenced admissions, probation and Youth Development Center (YDC) commitments. Figure 1 demonstrates regional juvenile court data. Cumberland exceeds the region in the number of youth referred for intake, approved for court, adjudicated delinquent and placed on probation. Figure 2 Cumberland County, generally, ranks 4th in the state for youth referred for intake services, those approved for court, secure detention high child abuse/maltreatment rates, high divorce rates, teen births and a large number of single parent households for many years.







Cumberland County's leadership has a well established reputation for combining resources and working together to reach the common goal of utilize community alternatives to the court system and avoid using juvenile court as the primary response to delinquent or other negative providing the highest quality supports and programming for youth and families. Law enforcement agencies, schools and court counseling staff behavior. Although there has been a decrease in juvenile crime rates, the majority of local juvenile crime is related to person and property crimes. JCPC programs implement evidence based curricula to develop aggression replacement techniques that lead to peaceful conflict resolution, peer resistance and coping strategies. Each JCPC program includes interpersonal skill building into each intervention plan to redirect negative behaviors.

How Are We Doing?

Cumberland JCPC Programs Update:

- Juvenile Assessment Center (JAC) (Cumberland Co. CommuniCare, Inc umbrella): Intake, comprehensive assessment, case / care coordination and referrals, case management, and various skill building groups. Of those completing services this year, 71% of achieved satisfactory or better outcomes.
- nterpersonal skill building activities. Recently awarded DJJDP funding to provide additional programming for level 2 probationers. Find-A-Friend (Fayetteville Urban Ministry umbrella): Provides specialized mentoring for youth gang members; group and Of those youth completing services this year, 78% of youth served achieved satisfactory or better outcomes.
- terminating from services, 100% successfully completed the Testing program requirements and 80% enrolled in the integration with System of Care at CCMHC/LME. JCO was awarded additional funds to serve level 2 probationers. Of those youth Juvenile Court Psychologist and Court Outreach Services / In-home Services (CCMHC/LME): Provides assessment, psychological testing, therapy, court consultations and technical assistance to the Courts and Court staff. Also includes in-home Counseling component achieved satisfactory or better outcomes. Of those youth completing the Home-Based services, psychosocial assessments, leadership of the Responsible Behavior Management groups for court involved youth and Services component, 92% achieved satisfactory or better outcomes. 0
- supervision and coordination of court ordered restitution and community service, case management and work site inspections for such Fayetteville-Cumberland County Juvenile Restitution Program (Fayetteville Police Dept/City of Fayetteville): Provides services as ordered by the Juvenile Court. Of those completing this program, 80% achieved satisfactory or better

The program also provides victim-offender mediation services for the Juvenile Court. Of those completing services in this year, 86% achieved satisfactory or better outcomes. 0
 - Group Care (Department of Social Services): residential care using a contingency/behavior and skill building model at both Right Track and Safe Landing group homes, offer medium range residential services to the courts and families for those youth who are unable to remain at home due to conflict, safety, or other related concerns. DSS also uses a few beds for emergency care when necessary. Of those completing services this year, 58% achieved satisfactory or better outcomes.

Are JCPC Programs Effective?

Cost Vs. Benefits

JCPC programming is a cost effective alternative to juvenile court. The average cost per consumer ratio of the county's interpersonal skill building programs is \$1,040. The average cost of juvenile probation for one year is \$3,000. JCPC programs save 50% of the cost of juvenile probation (many youth serving juvenile probation also participate in JCPC programming). More than has one of the highest usage rates of community programming. Data indicates the restorative focus of community programs yields 760 local youth and families have been served by JCPC programs in the current fiscal year. Annual data indicates Cumberland County more positive, longer-term outcomes. The cost to house a youth in a state YDC is approximately \$98,000 annually. Secure confinement in a juvenile detention facility costs the county and state agencies \$244 per day. According to DJJDP data, the 374 Cumberland County youth confined to a juvenile detention center during the previous year, for an average stay of & days, cost a total of \$730,048. Detention costs are divided equally between the county and state governments. The outcomes of our programs demonstrate that effective community-based programs addressing risks across home, school, community and peer domains that focus on skill building are the most cost beneficial approaches. The Cumberland Juvenile Crime Prevention Council and its funded programs express sincere appreciation to the Cumberland Legislative Delegation, the County of Cumberland and local policymakers for your continued support. ANNUAL REPORT

FINANCIAL AND SERVICES REPORT FOR FY ENDING JUNE 30, 2011

On behalf of the Board of Directors of Cumberland County CommuniCare, the staff and volunteers of CommuniCare, Inc., we present this report on the Corporation's operations for program year 2010-2011. CommuniCare strives to strengthen families throughout Cumberland County. Its core or basic services array includes the Juvenile Assessment Center and the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council's coordination/technical assistance functions that we began in 1998 as a nonprofit agency.

CORPORATE MISSION

CommuniCare, Inc. is a respected local non-profit organization with more than 13 years of experience serving youth and families. Under the leadership of county management staff, CommuniCare, Inc. was created in 1998 when the County of Cumberland was awarded a *Communities That Care* grant to establish a private non-profit agency to develop quality driven prevention and intervention services for at-risk and court involved youth by creating local alternatives to juvenile court. CommuniCare, Inc. continues to grow a successful relationship with the County of Cumberland based upon its program structure as well as the staff's abilities to provide superior project management in a myriad of areas including project and program development, oversight, financial planning/management and evidence based monitoring and evaluation activities.

CommuniCare provides family, child and neighborhood strengthening services to children ages 6 through 17 and their families throughout Cumberland County. CommuniCare has a multi-level approach to service development and delivery. We provide direct and care coordination services, primarily to lower income families and those who cannot afford services in the private sector. Services provided are as follows:

- Juvenile delinquency intervention and prevention (including crisis intervention);
- Substance abuse prevention and out-patient treatment & intensive out-patient treatment;
- Child abuse prevention; and.
- The reduction of risk characteristics leading to negative outcomes for children and their families.

CommuniCare delivers these direct services:

- Via direct interventions in the Juvenile Justice/Substance Abuse/Mental Health Partnership (JJ/SA/MH) program
- Selective/Indicated Substance Abuse services programs;
- The Intensive Services Network;
- Cumberland Gang Prevention Partnership;
- Substance Abuse screening services at the Cumberland Regional Juvenile Detention Center
- Reclaiming Futures initiative and through volunteer-driven services to parents & school children (to prevent substance use/abuse and child maltreatment) coordinated via CARES (Coalition for Awareness of Resources and Education of Substances).
- Comprehensive youth and family assessments, case management, crisis intervention;
- Parenting and parent-child communication training providing evidence-based parenting programs;
- Partnership with juvenile courts which includes the Strengthening Families Program, Active Parenting and other best practices curricula;
- Science-based prevention services via our Selective/Indicated work and through our liaison with the Cumberland Regional Detention Center;
- Clinical assessment and treatment in the IJ/SA/MH Partnership; and
- The Reclaiming Futures project, conducting asset, youth leadership skill development via our Teens Making a Change Youth Leadership program.

Many of the children and families served come from our most vulnerable families in low economic or poorly resourced communities. CommuniCare, Inc. also directly serves the nonprofit and faith communities in several key/important ways. The Corporation coordinates technical assistance and contract compliance for 6 Juvenile Crime Prevention Council programs and helps build their capacities to deliver quality outcomes via technical assistance in program evaluation, fiscal management and outcomes focused training.

CommuniCare also manages 3 additional coordination and intervention programs in partnership with other agencies as listed:

- 12th District Court Counselors,
- CC Dispute Resolution Center,
- Cumberland County Mental Health,
- © Cumberland County Schools-Aggression Replacement Training® and the Alternatives to Suspension (A2S) pilot project.
- Violence intervention/prevention coordination in partnership with the Cumberland Gang Prevention Partnership;
- Training sessions for community nonprofits/churches in nonprofit management and program development and administration (e.g., JCPC programs, other outside agencies as requested).

CommuniCare is by definition and mission, a community-building and collaboration-based agency. Everything we do is to those ends. The sheer numbers of coalitions, agencies we contact and interact with, the products/services/outcomes of our work all depend on effective collaboration and service coordination. We are in business to do that --- strengthen the umbrella of youth services throughout our county, build new services based on data-defined gaps such as the Aggression Replacement Training©, Discovering Art Camp, Archaeology Camp, Alternatives to Suspensions (A2S), Teens Making A Change, Strengthening Families Program and others, and evaluate and improve services via accountability methods, training, and research.

PROGRAM UPDATES

Intensive Services Network (ISN) - Through our collaboration with the 12th District Juvenile Court / Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, Cumberland County Mental Health Center's Community Collaborative and many others, CommuniCare offers the Intensive Services Network for the most high-risk youth involved in the court system. The majority of these are court-committed youth, which essentially means they are already committed to a state Youth Development Center (YDC). ISN provides 24/7 supervision and wrap-around supports for the youth and family to address the client's chronic criminal misbehavior in our community rather than confinement in a secure facility. During the 2010-2011 Program Year, ten youth were served by the ISN program. Of those terminating from the program during the reporting period, three youth were removed by court action. Although the success rate was lower than anticipated, ISN saved taxpayers approximately \$308,562 (based upon NCDJJDP annual YDC costs) by successfully managing the other youth in the community. 87% of ISN youth remained enrolled in their home school. One was long-term suspended.

T-MAC- The Teens Making a Change initiative (students focusing on the long range goals of reducing negative outcomes among youth) led by the ISN Care Manager continues to grow and strengthen peer leadership and community service opportunities for youth across the community. This group meets weekly and sustains an average attendance of 50+ youth in each session. This is a strong partnership with the Community Collaborative of CCMHC and "staffed" by 15-20 adult volunteers and other CommuniCare staff who assist the ISN Care Manager. T-MAC leaders mentored a community in Lumberton, NC in establishing their own version of the initiative.

Lafayette Plantation, one of the most high risk neighborhoods in the western part of the Cumberland County, combined their T-MAC program with the original site due to costs.

Cumberland Gang Prevention Partnership (CGPP)- We are now into our 6th year of strong partnerships with the 12th Judicial Court District as well as the Cumberland County Sheriff's Office, Fayetteville Police Department, Fayetteville Urban Ministry, Cumberland County Schools, Adult Probation and many others to sustain and improve a county-wide gang prevention/intervention (violent youth gang crime) partnership project. The Juvenile Crime Prevention Council awarded funding to continue this important work. In June a new CGPP Intervention Coordinator was hired and began work. This reporting period has been a revitalization effort for this project. To date, the project is gaining momentum. The partnership with the Fayetteville Police Department is growing.

Adolescent Substance Abuse Program & Reclaiming Futures- Complementing our juvenile justice focus, we provide an array of prevention and early intervention services offered by our corporation. Our agency created and fully implemented a clinical substance abuse treatment programming, the JJ/SA/MH Partnership services, as well as a highly productive substance abuse prevention component, the Selective and Indicated Substance Abuse Prevention activities. CommuniCare's JJ/SA/MH Partnership program continues to utilize the Reclaiming Futures model, which is a comprehensive response to drug and alcohol abuse.

Reclaiming Futures (RF) is grounded in the juvenile justice system by prioritizing youth that have been adjudicated or are at-risk of becoming involved in the juvenile court system. Reclaiming Futures involves all systems that touch the lives of youth including juvenile justice, alcohol/drug and mental health treatment, natural leaders, mentors, schools, various youth serving agencies and the family. The RF approach emphasizes more treatment, better treatment and moving beyond treatment into long-term recovery. CommuniCare was selected as one of North Carolina's six Reclaiming Future (RF) sites in September 2009. Our RF Project Director coordinates implementation across systems and assists a team of four fellows in directing our community's response to adolescent chemical dependency. The **Detention Assessment** program provided services for 182 youth confined to the Cumberland Regional Juvenile Detention Center and assisted in advocating for prevention/treatment services for them upon their release. Our **Selective/Indicated Prevention Services** served 997 youth and adults during the reporting period. This program leads our Strengthening Families program and provides individual screenings for parenting, anger management, communication and substance abuse prevention activities.

Juvenile Assessment Center (JAC) - The JAC is one of our original programs and remains part of our core functions. This program serves as a centralized assessment and case management program to provide services to youth on the very front-end of the juvenile system to deter them from further delinquent behavior. The program served 133 youth during this reporting period. 54.76% of the youth terminating services during this time achieved satisfactory or better outcomes. 96% remained enrolled in school.


Juvenile Crime Prevention Council Coordination- The JCPC Coordinator provides service coordination, technical assistance and support to the 25 member, commissioner appointed Council that makes recommendations regarding juvenile justice funding and comprehensive planning. This position acts as a liaison between the state Division of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention (DJJDP), the Council and local programs. The Council has worked hard to incorporate prevention elements into all facets of programming to prevent further involvement in the juvenile court system.


Our JCPC funded programs prioritize youth already involved in the juvenile court system for admission into programming services. Changes to funding priorities, ensuring fiscal accountability, adherence to state guidelines, outcomes management and other functions make this a critical link to achieving long-term outcomes for the community. The average cost per consumer ratio of the county's interpersonal skill building programs is \$1,258.00. The cost of juvenile probation for a one year period is \$2,941.90, which represents a cost savings of \$1,683.90. Cumberland County ranked 2nd in the state for JCPC program utilization during the reporting period.

PROGRAM ARRAY AND OUTCOMES

The following graphics provide an overview of our current service structure. This report also outlines some of the tangible, measurable results we have achieved throughout the corporation. Note that all of our services remain free of charge as of this report with the exception of the clinical substance abuse services – and these are covered by Medicaid, Health Choice, or state Mental Health dollars so that no costs occur to consumers. This is due to the ongoing support we get from the County of Cumberland, the NC State Legislature, the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, the United Way, as well as our private donors and funding contributors.


During FY 2011 we opened service records on 1724 youth and families --- 58% African American, 34% Caucasian, with the remainder coming from Hispanic/Latino, Asian, Native American and "Other" racial/ethnic categories. These youth and families were served in the Juvenile Assessment Center, Intensive Services Network, and our Cumberland Gang Partnership Prevention, Detention Screening program, the JJ/SA/MH Partnership and Selective/Indicated Prevention programs. However, we touch thousands more families in our coordination, collaboration, media and public relations work. Our Prevention staff members, for example, provide substance abuse education and prevention materials/training to over 1,000 youth and families in various community settings and groups). As you can see, our impact is widespread.






FIGURES 1 & 2: Juvenile Assessment Center Case Management Termination Outcomes (Note: 54.76% Completely or Satisfactorily Completed Services Rates); School Status

FIGURES 3 & 4: Intensive Services Network Termination Outcomes




Figure #4: ISN Overall Progress at Termination, FY 2010.11




FIGURE 5: FY 2010 JJ/SA/MH Partnership Clinical Program Data

CHALLENGES

As typical for all non-profit agencies, our challenges are constant in the areas of funding, physical space, and long term sustainability. Developing and sustaining diverse, sufficient long-term operating capital is always a top priority. Thus, developing local fundraising projects and the goal of increasing program revenues are top ongoing priorities for our Board of Directors. As the programs have grown, staffing complements have now created occupancy needs if further expansion is to occur. CommuniCare staff members occupy 100% of the building. We continue to predict long term growth in the clinical services which requires planning as to how to gain access to affordable, appropriate space for expanded services.
