BACKGROUND:

North Carolina General Statute 105-369 requires the Collector to report unpaid taxes for the current fiscal year that are liens on real property by the first Monday in February. The purpose of the reporting is to allow the board of commissioners to order the Tax Collector to advertise the tax liens. Upon receipt of the board's order, the tax liens will be advertised by posting notice at the County Courthouse and by publishing each lien at least one time in one or more of the newspapers having general circulation in Cumberland County.

The statute requires that advertisement period to occur during the period of March 1st through June 30th. The intention is to deliver the list of delinquent taxes to the newspaper in the latter part of March for advertisement in early to mid-April. The delinquent report will be on display in the Clerk's office through February 4, 2013 in CD format. After this date, the report will be available in CD format in the Tax Administrator's office.

E. Approval of Payment of Past Year Invoice for Services Rendered to the Cumberland County Health Department

F. Approval of a Resolution to Seek the Amendment of North Carolina Session Law 2004-75 - Senate Bill 1161 Enacted July 8, 2004

A RESOLUTION TO SEEK THE AMENDMENT OF NORTH CAROLINA SESSION LAW 2004-75 SENATE BILL 1161 ENACTED JULY 8, 2004

WHEREAS, the North Carolina General Assembly adopted Session Law 2004-75 known as "An Act to Require Counties and Cities Near Military Bases to Give Notice of Land-Use Planning Changes to the Military Bases", and

WHEREAS, the law continues to be a very effective and important tool in facilitating communication between North Carolina's military bases and the surrounding local governments (cities and counties) concerning proposed zoning changes within five miles of the bases, and

WHEREAS, certain provisions of the existing law have proven to be burdensome for both the military and local governments to implement, and

WHEREAS, certain other potentially incompatible land uses were omitted from the law's notification requirements.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the <u>Cumberland County Board of Commissioners</u> hereby requests the North Carolina General Assembly to adopt the following amendments to North Carolina Session Law 2004-75:

- A. Delete the requirement for a "certified mail" notification to the military base commanders [152A-323 (b) and 160A-364 (b)], and
- B. Include the additional requirement for base commanders "or their designees" to be notified of proposed subdivisions, telecom towers, and windmills within the five-mile area.
- G. Approval of Proclamation Recognizing February as "Career and Technical Education Month" in Cumberland County

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, February 1-28, 2013, has been designated Career and Technical Education Month by the Association for Career and Technical Education; and

WHEREAS, profound economic and technological changes in our society are rapidly reflected in the structure and nature of work, thereby placing new and additional responsibilities on our educational system; and

WHEREAS, career and technical education provides Americans with a school-to-careers connection and is the backbone of a strong, well-educated workforce, which fosters productivity in business and industry and contributes to America's leadership in the international marketplace; and

WHEREAS, career and technical education gives high school students experience in practical, meaningful applications of skills such as reading, writing and mathematics, thus improving the quality of their education, motivating potential dropouts and giving all students leadership opportunities in their fields and in their communities; and

WHEREAS, career and technical education offers individuals lifelong opportunities to learn new skills, which provide them with career choices and potential satisfaction; and

WHEREAS, the ever-increasing cooperative efforts of career and technical educators, business and industry stimulate the growth and vitality of our local economy and that of the entire nation by preparing graduates for career fields forecast to experience the largest and fastest growth in the next decade.

NOW THEREFORE, we, the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners, do hereby proclaim February 1-28, 2013, as Career and Technical Education Month in Cumberland County Schools, and urge all citizens to become familiar with the services and benefits offered by the career and technical education programs in this community and to support and participate in these programs to enhance their individual work skills and productivity.

(1) Eastover Sanitary District Debt/Eastover Sanitary General Fund

Revision in the amount of 76,809 to reduce appropriation of fund balance from Eastover Sanitary District General Fund for the transfer to Eastover Sanitary District Debt Service Fund. (B13-226 and B13-226A) Funding Source – Eastover Sanitary General Fund Fund Balance

(2) Mental Health Child and Youth Contracts

ITEMS OF BUSINESS

3. Presentation of the Preliminary Draft of the 2013 Federal Legislative Agenda by Leslie Mozingo of The Ferguson Group

BACKGROUND:

The City of Fayetteville, Cumberland County and the Fayetteville Regional Chamber of Commerce have partnered with The Ferguson Group to develop a community-wide federal legislative agenda for calendar year 2013. The partners met December 12th in a series of meetings with city and county department heads to discuss community federal advocacy needs with The Ferguson Group lobbyists Debra Bryant and Sara Guy.

During the day-long workshop, time was allocated for city council members and county commissioners to meet with the lobbyists. Based on these sessions with elected officials, local government staff and chamber representatives, The Ferguson Group developed a draft of the Calendar Year 2013 Federal Legislative Agenda for the board of commissioners' review and discussion.

The initiatives are not in priority order. The agenda is based on critical projects and legislative advocacy concerns identified by the partners as community priorities. Additionally, these are areas in which our lobbyists think the partners can be successful.

Similar to the 2012 federal agenda, this year's draft agenda represents a major change from years past. Instead of focusing on earmarks, it looks at federal grant opportunities and legislative advocacy. Leslie Mozingo of The Ferguson Group will explain this year's process and the lobbying group's shift to providing competitive grant services.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Provide feedback on the draft agenda so that a final version can be prepared for approval.

The City of Fayetteville, Cumberland County, and the Fayetteville Regional Chamber of Commerce have formed a strategic partnership to establish a federal advocacy agenda. Federal funding and policy decisions are critical to the growth and strength of our community. In the best interest of their constituents, the partners have prioritized infrastructure, technology and programmatic needs. The combined advocacy efforts will protect and preserve essential community assets and resources, allowing Fort Bragg and its surrounding metropolitan and unincorporated areas to thrive. Therefore, the partners call upon the advocacy of its Congressional delegation to support their highest priorities.

HOMELAND SECURITY, EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND PUBLIC SAFETY

Combating gun violence, gangs, domestic violence and human trafficking are top priorities. Our community operates under constant public safety danger based on the national security agenda, proximity to Fort Bragg, and our central location and accessibility to interstate highways. Interoperability improvements are a must for our community, yet there is no funding to do so. The military security component creates unique challenges in communications between first responders and the military. County public safety agencies, the city police and fire departments are in need of updating radio systems to be P-25 compliant. Additionally, radio interoperability between the city, county and Fort Bragg emergency services is very limited.

<u>Position:</u> Invest in our nation's homeland security, public safety and local first responders.

North Carolina has a population of 760,000 veterans. Cumberland County has the third largest population of veterans for any county and ranks first for all categories of disabled veterans, including 100 percent disabled. Fayetteville and Cumberland County are proud to be the home of Fort Bragg, the second largest military installation in the world, and consider it a privilege to serve active-duty military and veterans. Yet the impact on local government, and our health and human services agencies, is significant. Increasingly

limited resources are threatening the delivery of health-related and social services for veterans and our military population, who have been at war continuously for 12 years.

<u>Position:</u> Advocate for targeted funding and legislation to assist with veterans support services, mental health resources, homelessness, and military workforce development.

Public transit is a Smart Growth environmental priority for the region. Fayetteville's public transit system has experienced an increase in public transit use of 80 percent since 2008. Airport funding must be protected and expanded as our military and business sectors greatly rely on the services provided by Fayetteville Regional Airport and are invested in the future growth of these services. It is imperative that we preserve our natural resources, and green spaces to create beautiful, walkable communities. Fayetteville's parks and recreation facilities lag behind the national standard and struggle to provide quality of life programs for all its citizens, including the military families our community supports.

<u>Position:</u> Advocate for the authorization of a well-funded, long-term, comprehensive surface transportation program. Advocate for enhanced congressional support for urban design, air quality improvement, traffic calming, street widening, and pedestrian safety improvements on roadways and corridor projects that will promote business development and necessary military transit. Advocate for infrastructure funding to accelerate job growth, assist communities with declining infrastructure, including capital projects for Parks and Recreation facilities.

Leslie Mozingo, The Ferguson Group, referenced the draft of the 2013 federal legislative agenda as recorded above. Ms. Mozingo reviewed the process The Ferguson Group lobbyists undertook with the City of Fayetteville, Cumberland County and the Fayetteville Regional Chamber of Commerce and their departmental staff to ensure that the federal agenda was based on critical projects and legislative advocacy concerns that supported the economy, created jobs and built upon infrastructure. Ms. Mozingo stated this year's draft agenda, as with last year's, represented a major change from years past because instead of focusing on earmarks, it looks at federal grant opportunities and legislative advocacy.

Ms. Mozingo advised an item had been added to the Transportation, Environment and Infrastructure category to address community support for opportunities to accelerate the construction of I-295. Commissioner Council asked the lobbyists to look for opportunities for Cumberland County's schools and education to take care of the children of service men and women and federally connected employees. Commissioner Council also asked the lobbyists to

look for grants to launch or fund pilot projects. Ms. Mozingo advised that in addition to looking for grant opportunities, the lobbyists also look for potential threats or budget cutting measures to make sure that aid to the community is not subjected to unfair cuts. Commissioner Council also requested help with detention centers.

Commissioner Evans asked whether there would be an opportunity for the county to recoup money invested in pilot programs and Commissioner King asked whether the economic development and revitalization of Murchison Road was included on the federal agenda. Ms. Mozingo asked if the request was to specifically name Murchison Road. Chairman Keefe stated the agenda should be modified to specifically name the Murchison Road corridor as opposed to just having it implied under the priority initiative for community gateway and transportation corridor beautification funding. The Board members concurred with this suggestion by consensus.

Commissioner Evans asked that the agenda also include an officer for the Sheriff's Office that would work full time with the Fayetteville Police Department on homelessness. Ms. Mozingo explained the Cops Hiring Grant and stated one of the challenges associated with the grant was that the community has to pick up the costs when the grant expires. Ms. Mozingo stated she was not aware of anything under the grant that specifically addressed homelessness but she could research it further since it is an annual grant that helps launch additional cops on the street. Ms. Mozingo stated in order to avoid officer layoffs, there has to be a guarantee that the position will be continued when the grant expires.

At the request of Chairman Keefe, Ms. Mozingo concluded her remarks by addressing upcoming federal issues that could affect counties.

4. Consideration of Sale of Parcel of Land to Goodson Company

BACKGROUND:

At its June 21, 2010 meeting, the Board adopted a resolution proposing to accept the offer of R. E. Goodson Construction Co., Inc., to purchase that 2.72 acre tract of land described in the deed recorded in Book 5147 at page 234 and further identified as Parcel ID 0512-48-2469 for a purchase price of 25,840. This property adjoins the Little River, is in a flood zone, was acquired by FEMA funds and any conveyance shall be subject to the restriction that the land must be maintained as open space in perpetuity. This parcel adjoins a 97 acre parcel that the Goodson Company purchased for use as a borrow pit and the Company wanted the county parcel as a means of access to the borrow pit.

The county attorney advised the Goodson Company of the Board's June 21, 2010 action and that the Company must post a deposit in order for the county to advertise the proposed sale subject to the upset bid procedure. The Company did not post the deposit and did not communicate further with the county attorney until December of 2012. At that time the Company advised that it had been unable to proceed with the purchase due to environmental issues on the 97 acre tract but that it had resolved those issues and wished to proceed with the purchase at that time. The Company posted the required deposit and the proposed sale was advertised in the Fayetteville Observer on January 15, 2013. The upset bid period ended on January 25, 2013. No upset bids were received.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Approve the sale of that 2.72 acre tract of land described in the deed recorded in Book 5147 at page 234 to the R. E. Goodson Construction Company, Inc., for 25,840 subject to the restriction that the land must be maintained as open space in perpetuity.

Rick Moorefield, County Attorney, reviewed the background information as recorded above.
