- B. Approval of Bid Award for Voice Interoperability Plan for Emergency Responders (VIPER) System to Motorola Solutions, Inc.

BACKGROUND:

The county acquired services of Mission Critical Partners (MCP) for specification development, bid evaluation and formulation of recommendation in response of Project 25 (P25) compliance. The attached letter from MCP addresses the bid in accordance with North Carolina Voice Interoperability Plan of Emergency Responders (VIPER). The

VIPER system is controlled and maintained by the North Carolina Highway Patrol and oversight by the system manager Mr. Mike Hodgson. The system manager expects P25 cutover June or July 2014. Cumberland County Communications Center must be P25 ready by April 30, 2014.

P25 targeted four primary objectives:

- Allow effective, efficient, and reliable intra-agency communications...so organizations can easily implement interoperable and seamless joint communications in both routine and emergency circumstances
- Ensure competition in system life cycle procurements...so agencies can choose from multiple vendors and products, ultimately saving, money and gaining the freedom to select from the widest range of equipment and features.
- Provide user-friendly equipment...so users can take full advantage of their radios 'lifesaving capabilities on the job-even under adverse conditions with minimal training.
- Improve radio spectrum efficiency...so networks will have enough capacity to handle calls and allow room for growth, even in areas where the spectrum is crowded and it's difficult for agencies to obtain licenses for additional radio frequencies.

Cumberland County communication center is connected to the North Carolina State Voice Interoperability Plan for Emergency Responders (VIPER) system and the center currently operates on an 800 megahertz (MHZ) Smart Zone trunked radio system. The VIPER system network is maintained by the North Carolina Highway Patrol. The connection is specialized as a hardwire connection by use of fiber cable from the communication center to the network site. This provides enhanced communication features for public safety.

The VIPER bid submitted by Motorola was as follows:

Equipment, training, etc. \$694,496 Maintenance-5 years 111,833 Total Bid \$806,329

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Approve the bid from Motorola Solutions, Inc. as recommended by Mission Critical Partners subject to further negotiations. MCP identified potential cost savings in portions of the proposal involving encryption, microphones, control stations, maintenance and spare parts. Additional savings may be recognized if the County elects to purchase equipment for a backup dispatch center. MCP will provide assistance to the County with any negotiations.

C. Approval of a Proclamation Proclaiming February 2014 as "Human Relations" Month" in Cumberland County

Uncontested Rezoning Cases

A. Case P14-01: Rezoning of 2.29+/- acres from A1 Agricultural to R40 Residential, or to a more restrictive zoning district, located at 3235 John McMillan Road, submitted by James R. Seals (owner) and Timothy Evans.

Staff Recommendation: Adopt and approve the reasonableness statement, find request consistent with LUP and approve R40

Planning Board Recommendation: Approve Staff Recommendation

Tom Lloyd, Planning and Inspections Director, presented this item. Mr. Lloyd stated planning staff's recommendation and the recommendation of the Planning Board was to adopt and approve the reasonableness statement, find the request consistent with LUP and approve R40. Mr. Lloyd further stated there is no opposition to rezoning Case P14-01.

This is the duly advertised/noticed public hearing set for this date and time.

Chairman Council opened the public hearing.

The Clerk to the Board advised there were no speakers.

Chairman Council closed the public hearing.

Contested Conditional Zoning Case

B. Case P13-50: Rezoning of 1.37+/- acres from R20 Residential to M(P) Planned Industrial, or to a more restrictive zoning district, located at 725 and 729 Snow Hill Road, submitted by Huxley A. and Ahuilda J. Jones (owners).

Staff Recommendation: Denial of M(P)/CZ for ammunition remanufacturing, assembly and distribution as request is not reasonable nor consistent with LUP Planning Board Recommendation: Approve Staff Recommendation

Tom Lloyd, Planning and Inspections Director, presented this item and stated Case P13-50 is a request for M(P)/CZ conditional zoning to allow ammunition remanufacturing, assembly and distribution. Mr. Lloyd provided a brief history of the rezoning of the property and stated staff could have worked with the petitioner on the request under the property's zoning classification prior to December, 2013. Mr. Lloyd showed vicinity maps and aerial views of the subject property, and provided overviews of the current land uses, current zonings, and surrounding land uses and zonings.

Mr. Lloyd stated the Planning Board was ready to deny the request for M(P) Planned Industrial but suggested that the applicants come back with a request for conditional zoning, which they did. Mr. Lloyd stated the Planning Board considered granting the rezoning until the meeting last month, but had two objections; overbuilding on the site and the subject property's proximity to the Fayetteville Regional Airport. Mr. Lloyd stated following the meeting of the Planning Board, the airport director reanalyzed the situation and withdrew his objection.

Mr. Lloyd stated prior to this meeting, the applicant asked to be able to work with Planning staff. Mr. Lloyd stated staff do not object to working with the applicant because the overbuilding issue can be resolved, the property was zoned M(P) originally and the airport director's objections are no longer an issue. Mr. Lloyd responded to questions and discussed ensued regarding M(P) setback requirements.

This is the duly advertised/noticed public hearing set for this date and time.

Chairman Council opened the public hearing.

The Clerk to the Board called the following speakers:

Tim Evans – Mr. Evans appeared in favor as the previous owner of the property, explained how the property was split by NCDOT's realignment of Snow Hill Road and how the splitting of the property prevented the property from meeting the set back requirements under M(P) zoning.

Huxley Jones – Mr. Jones, owner of the property, appeared in favor and asked that the case be returned to Planning staff so it can be reworked and brought back to the Board at a later date.

Chairman Council closed the public hearing.

MOTION: Commissioner King moved that Case P13-50 be returned for the

applicant to work with planning staff.

SECOND: Commissioner Melvin

VOTE: PASSED (6-1) (Commissioners Melvin, Edge, Council, Faircloth, King

and Keefe voted in favor; Commissioner Evans voted in opposition)

ITEMS OF BUSINESS

4. Consideration of Approval of Jail Health Medical Plan as Outlined in NC G.S. 153A-225

BACKGROUND:

The manual provides the plan for providing medical care for inmates at the Cumberland County Detention Center. The plan is designed to protect the health and welfare of the inmates, avoid the spread of contagious diseases, provide for medical supervision of inmate and emergency medical care for the inmates to the extent necessary for their health and welfare, and provide for the detection, examination and treatment of inmates who are infected with tuberculosis or venereal diseases. It includes a procedure in the event of a death and discharge planning for patients to another facility.

The plan complies with 10A NCAC 14J.1001 titled Medical Plan. NC G.S. 153A-225 states the plan must be adopted by the governing body.

The original plan will be available for review in the Clerk's office.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Adopt the Jail Health Medical Plan.

Mr. Martin stated he recently learned that the Jail Health Medical Plan had to be approved annually by the Board of Commissioners as prepared by the Health Department in consultation with the Sheriff's Office. Mr. Martin asked the Board to consider adopting the plan in order to meet that requirement and that the changes forthcoming from the attorney for the Sheriff's Office be considered as amendments to the plan at the appropriate time.

Buck Wilson, Public Health Director, stated the plan is reviewed annually by the Public Health Director, the Medical Director and the medical doctor at the jail. Mr. Wilson stated the plan undergoes review every year and the plan is required to be adopted by the governing body. Mr. Wilson advised in order to comply with 10A NCAC 14J.1001, the written plan has to include policies and procedures that address the following areas:

- 1) Health and screening of inmates upon admission;
- 2) Handling routine medical care;
- 3) The handling of inmates with chronic illnesses or known communicable diseases or conditions;
- 4) Administration, dispensing and control of prescription and non-prescription medications;
- 5) Handling emergency medical problems, including but not limits to emergencies involving dental care, chemical dependence, pregnancy and mental health;
- 6) Maintenance and confidentiality of medical records; and
- 7) Privacy during medical examinations and conferences with qualified medical personnel.

Commissioner King asked Rick Moorefield, County Attorney, whether he had reviewed the plan. Mr. Moorefield stated he had not reviewed the plan due to issues involving timing. Additional questions followed. Mr. Wilson confirmed a jail health plan had been in place for years but this was the first year to his knowledge that the Board of Commissioners had been asked to adopt the plan. Commissioner Keefe asked if there would be any issues with the Board approving the plan as presented and having the Health Department work with the Sheriff's Office in the future. Mr. Wilson stated there would be no issues.

MOTION: Commissioner Keefe moved to approve the Jail Health Medical Plan.

SECOND: Commissioner Faircloth

DISCUSSION: Chairman Council stated her question had been the same as Commissioner Keefe's because her concern was that the plan be developed in collaboration with the Sheriff's Office.

Commissioner Faircloth withdrew his second to the motion. Discussion followed. Mr. Moorefield confirmed that if substantive changes are made to the plan, the Health Director can bring the plan back to the Board at that time.

Commissioner Faircloth restored his second to the motion.

VOTE: PASSED (4-3) (Commissioners Melvin, Edge, Faircloth and King voted in favor; Commissioners Council, King and Evans voted in opposition)

5. Update on Mental Health Services Provided by Cape Fear Valley Health System

BACKGROUND:

Mike Nagowski will provide an update on the mental health services provided by the Cape Fear Valley Health System (CFVHS).

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

For information purposes only.

Mike Nagowski, CEO Cape Fear Valley Health System, introduced Dr. Sam Fleishman, Medical Director for Behavioral Health Services at CFVHS and the Mental Health Clinic; Doug Webster, Administrative Director for Behavioral Health Services and the Mental Health Clinic; and Breeden Blackwell, Director of Government Affairs and Relations. Mr. Nagowski stated a collaborate effort by Cumberland County, CFVHS, Alliance Behavioral Healthcare and law enforcement brought about the opening of the clinic on July 1, 2013. Mr. Nagowski stated patient encounters have increased 45% through January, 2014 and new patient evaluations have increased by more than 68%. Mr. Nagowski also stated a big step in patient access to services was the expansion of the walk-in capability.

Mr. Nagowski stated in mid-November, children's services were moved from the Bradford Avenue site to the main campus at CFVHS with the goal to separate children's services from the severely mentally ill. Mr. Nagowski stated children's therapy has increased 51% through January, 2014 and services have expanded to the Child Advocacy Center where clinicians are providing services one day a week. Mr. Nagowski stated CFVHS is one of six facilities in North Carolina receiving highly specialized training in peer-child interaction therapy which is important for severely disturbed children ages 3 to 6. Mr. Nagowski stated in December, 2013, CFVHS was selected to be the provider for the Cumberland County School System.

Mr. Nagowski stated the Pharmacy Medication Assistance Program (PMAP) is an effort to provide medications for individuals who have an immediate need for it so they can begin taking the medication while waiting for their prescriptions to be filled. Mr. Nagowski stated this dramatically reduces the amount of re-admissions these individuals face.

Mr. Nagoswki stated over the past several weeks, the Roxie Avenue Center has been expanded and the Mental Health Center has been relocated to the second floor so scheduled appointments and the walk-in center are both located at the Roxie Avenue Center. Mr. Nagowski stated on February 3rd, a 23-bed observation unit had a soft opening. Mr. Nagowski stated the observation unit provides an opportunity to stabilize patients during their first 2-3 hours at the center either through medications or therapies in order to avoid admission.

Dr. Fleishman offered comments regarding the positive effects of consolidating crisis evaluation and stabilization with other mental health services to take individuals that otherwise would have ended up in the emergency department to the appropriate level of care.

Chairman Council recognized Rob Robinson, Alliance Behavioral Health Chief Operating Office who will become the Chief Executive Officer on April 1, 2014, and Hank Debnam, Alliance Behavioral Healthcare Cumberland County site director.

Mr. Webster stated another area of collaboration came from Chief District Court Judge Beth Keever who supported crisis intervention training for the magistrates because they perform involuntary commitments.

VOTE: PASSED (5-2) (Commissioners Evans, Melvin, Edge, Faircloth and Keefe voted

in favor; Commissioners Council and King voted in opposition)

Chairman Council announced the Board of Commissioners hired The Mercer Group from Atlanta, Georgia as the search firm for the recruitment of a new county manager.
