Chairman Faircloth called the meeting to order.

INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE – Commissioner Lancaster provided the invocation followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

Recognition of Cumberland County Information Services Department for receiving 5th place in the 250,000-499,999 Population Category for the 2016 Center for Digital Government Award

Chairman Faircloth recognized Information Services Department Director Keith Todd and staff members Shamon Larson, David Wilkes and Kim Honan for the Center for Digital Government (CDG) and the National Association of Counties (NACo) recognizing Cumberland County as one of the most technologically innovative counties in the nation. Chairman Faircloth stated Cumberland County ranked fifth in the 250,000-499,999 population category out of similar sized counties throughout the country. Chairman Faircloth stated the Digital Counties Survey is conducted annually in partnership with NACo to recognize leading examples of counties using technology to improve services and boost efficiencies and to identify the best technology practices among U.S. counties. Chairman Faircloth stated this is Cumberland County's first attempt in its size category and he is proud to know that the County's Information Service Department is in the top tier. Chairman Faircloth stated Cumberland County launched a Business Intelligence initiative in 2015 to proactively seek opportunities to increase efficiencies, improve operations, enhance customer service and ultimately reduce costs to the County. Comments followed.

1. Approval of Agenda

MOTION: Commissioner Lancaster moved to approve the agenda.

SECOND: Commissioner Council VOTE: UNANIMOUS (7-0)

2. Presentation by Alba Polonkey, Sustainable Sandhills on Weather-Ready Sandhills: Sustainable Resource Management for Resilient Communities

Alba Polonkey, Sustainability Manager for Sustainable Sandhills, stated Weather-Ready Sandhills: Sustainable Resource Management is about proactive versus reactive planning for climate resilient communities. Ms. Polokey provided background information on Sustainable Sandhills, a nonprofit based in Cumberland County, and its sustainable practices.

Ms. Polonkey stated her presentation will include the following:

- 1. 2015 Climate Planning Process Overview
- 2. Weather-Related Risks and Existing Aspects of Concerns
- 3. Strategic Adaptation Plan and Weather-Ready Sandhills Forums
- 4. Opportunities for Involvement

Ms. Polonkey stated the name of the ten-month long distant learning program for the 2015 climate planning process is Climate Solutions University. Ms. Polonkey stated Sustainable Sandhills partnered with a diverse group of organizations within the community, all with a different mission and goal but with a common understanding that natural resources are important to protect and that there are certain weather related risks that communities and the region are facing.

Ms. Polonkey stated the geographic region focused on included the Cape Fear River and watersheds in Cumberland County. Ms. Polonkey stated ecosystem assessment tools were used to conduct a risk analysis that focused on the weaknesses and strengths of the community and how changing weather patterns might put additional stresses on the quality of life. Ms. Polonkey stated the Cumberland County Resiliency Plan was developed as a result the risk analysis. Ms. Polonkey also stated Sustainable Sandhills was recently awarded the 2016 North Carolina Chapter of the American Planning Association Award in the Special Theme/Multidisciplinary Category. Ms. Polonkey stated multidisciplinary efforts are the way comprehensive planning should be conducted in the future because there is not a one-way solution to address all the problems.

Ms. Polonkey provided a brief overview of the following weather related risks:

- Heat
- Drought
- Severe Weather
- Heavy Downpours

Ms. Polonkey then provided highlights of impacts associated with weather related risks and stated these are not the only industries that will be affected. Ms. Polonkey stated it is important to keep in mind that weather related risks can happen in a compounding ways such as the link between heat and drought.


- Agriculture
 - Prescribed burn days / wildfires
 - Growth interruptions; growing season demands; damage
 - Pests and disease
- Water
 - Hypoxic conditions and concentrated pollutants; stormwater
 - Competition / increased demand
 - Social and economic development
 - Energy demand and electrical grid
 - Public health and safety

Ms. Polonkey stated existing aspects of concern not necessarily related to weather include the following three main categories. Ms. Polonkey stated 65% of the County is classified as forested or used for agriculture which equates to 300,000 jobs, \$105,000 in agricultural products and \$38 million in services and products from forests. Ms. Polonkey stated the use of water above and below the County is important.

- Forest and agriculture land
- Drinking and potable water
- Social equity and economic development

Ms. Polonkey stated comprehensive planning comes with the understanding that none of the elements can thrive without the others doing well. Ms. Polonkey stated as a community we are only as strong as our weakest link because if the natural environment is polluted or if it is not being managed sustainably in a way that it can be replenished, then the community cannot thrive

as a whole. Ms. Polonkey reviewed the graphic below and stated the strategy in the Adaptation Plan is about continuous improvement and revision of different policies and plans to make sure what is being done is working.



In closing, Ms. Polonkey shared the following opportunities for involvement:

- WeatherReadySandhills Forums
- Short Term Workplan
- Resiliency Element
- Working Lunch Meeting

Chairman Faircloth thanked Ms. Polonkey for the presentation and Sustainable Sandhills for being ahead of the curve and keeping everyone aware of the issues.

Amy Cannon, County Manager, stated the new financial software has eliminated a lot of paper involved with transactions and budget revisions are now electronically entered and processed. Ms. Cannon stated as a result, the format for budget revisions had to be changed and the challenge was to provide the Board with as much information as possible in a narrative format. Ms. Cannon called on Melissa Cardinali, Assistant County Manager, to provide an explanation of the budget ordinance amendments or rollover budget revisions reflected under consent agenda Items 3.G.(7) - 3.G.(12).

Ms. Cardinali stated each fiscal year County departments have projects that are incomplete by the fiscal year end or June 30, or have items ordered that have not been received by fiscal year end. Ms. Cardinali stated those projects or items were approved in the Fiscal Year 2016 budget but associated funds were not spent and therefore become part of fund balance. Ms. Cardinali stated these budget ordinance amendments seek to bring those funds forward into the current fiscal year, allowing departments to complete and pay for these projects. Ms. Cardinali noted that Item 3.G.(8) is the re-appropriation of 911 funds and not the use of General Fund fund balance and stated this is not new money. Chairman Faircloth suggested identifying the specific name of the fund balance.

- B. Approval of Action on Tax Collector's Preliminary Report and Proposed Annual Settlement

BACKGOUND:

North Carolina General Statutes, Section 105-373 requires the Tax Collector of Cumberland County after the 1st day of July of each year to render a preliminary report to the Board of County Commissioners concerning persons whose tax liabilities remain unpaid and to propose an annual settlement of taxes charged to him for collection for the past year. The Tax Collector has submitted such preliminary report and proposed settlement. The preliminary report consists of (i) a list of persons owning real property whose taxes for the tax year of 2015-2016 remain unpaid, (ii) a list of the persons not

owning real property whose taxes for the year 2015-2016 remain unpaid (the proposed insolvent list), and (iii) a statement under oath by the Tax Collector that he has made diligent efforts to collect such taxes. The proposed settlement consists of the amounts of taxes with which the Tax Collector has been charged for the year and the amounts of credits against such charges, the real and personal property tax balance is charged to the forthcoming tax year.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

The statute requires the Board to review the preliminary report, determine the insolvent list to be entered into the minutes, credit the Tax Collector with the insolvent list and make a settlement, i.e., approve or correct the proposed settlement. The Legal Department has reviewed for legal sufficiency. Recommendation is that the Board adopts the resolution recorded below as Exhibit D.

EXHIBIT D

Resolution accepting preliminary report of the Tax Collector, crediting the insolvent list, and approving proposed annual settlement.

Whereas, North Carolina General Statutes, Section 105-373, requires the Tax Collector of Cumberland County after the 1st day of July of each year to render a preliminary report to the Board of County Commissioners concerning persons whose tax liabilities remain unpaid and to propose an annual settlement of taxes charged to the Tax Collector for collection for the past ten years; and

Whereas, the Tax Collector has submitted such preliminary report and proposed settlement.

Now therefore, the Board of Commissioners of Cumberland County hereby resolves:

- 1. That the preliminary report of the Tax Collector of Cumberland County, consisting of (i) a list of persons owning real property whose taxes for the preceding fiscal year 2015 2016 remain unpaid and the principal amount owned by each person; (ii) a list of the persons not owning or who have not listed real property whose taxes for the preceding fiscal tax year 2015 2016 remain unpaid and the principal amount owned by each person (the proposed insolvent list) and (iii) a statement under oath by the Tax Collector that he has made diligent efforts to collect such taxes, be and it hereby is, accepted;
- 2. That the Board hereby finds that the persons in the list of those that do not own or have not listed real property are insolvent as that term is used in G.S. 105-373, directs that the list of such person be entered into the minutes of the meeting of the Board as the insolvent list, and further directs that the amounts in such list be, and hereby are, credited to the Tax Collector in his annual settlement;
- 3. That the proposed settlement of the Tax Collector, appended hereto, for taxes in his hands for collection for the fiscal tax year 2015 2016, be and it hereby is, approved and that he be, and thereby is, charged with the amounts set forth in the settlement under the heading "Charges" and credited with the amounts set forth in the settlement under the heading "Credits".

C. Approval of FY2016-2017 Tax Levy Charge to the Tax Collector

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

A copy of the order must be delivered to the Collector at the time the tax receipts are delivered to him. Recommendation is that the Board approve the levy and charge the Collector with the responsibility to collect the taxes.

FY17 Tax Charge

State of North Carolina

County of Cumberland and all Municipalities through Inter-Local Agreement

To the Tax Collector of the County of Cumberland and Municipalities through Inter-Local Agreement.

You are hereby authorized, empowered, and commanded to collect the taxes set forth in the tax records filed in the office of Tax Administration and in the tax receipts herewith delivered to you, in the amounts and from taxpayers likewise therein set forth. Such taxes are hereby declared to be a first lien upon all real property of the respective taxpayers in the County of Cumberland and Municipalities through Inter-Local Agreement, and this order shall be a full

and sufficient authority to direct, require, and enable you to levy on and sell any real or personal property of such taxpayers, for and on account thereof, in accordance with law.

The Cumberland County Agricultural Hall of Fame committee met on Tuesday, July 26, 2016 and selected Mr. George Quigley as the 2016 nominee for induction into the prestigious Cumberland County Agricultural Hall of Fame. Please submit Mr. Quigley's application to the Board of Commissioners for approval for induction. Recorded below is supporting background information on Mr. Quigley.

Please describe the nominee's farming operation/agricultural work:

You will not find George Quigley on a tractor; however, you will find him teaching anyone that will listen about landscaping or how to plant a garden. Mr. George Quigley is a retired lieutenant colonel who served 34 years in the U.S. Army, and is well known throughout Cumberland County for his work of giving back to our community as a volunteer. George has never run a farming operation; however, his agricultural work (in a volunteer capacity) is second to none. Some of his most notable agricultural work contributions have been centered with Cumberland County Cooperative Extension. George is a graduate of the 1996 inaugural Extension Master Gardener class. After graduating from the class, George became a permanent fixture in the Extension office. Twenty years later, George continues to be one of our state's strongest advocates for Cooperative Extension. On most days, he can be found teaching horticulture classes, answering the Extension Master Gardener telephone hotline, serving on committees, hosting farm tours, and other various activities, all with a mission to assist Cooperative Extension and promote agriculture. George frequently makes legislative visits to ensure legislation is passed to benefit farmers and the agricultural industry. Legislative representatives know him by name and always greet him by asking "what agricultural issue are you bringing to us today?"

Please describe the nominee's significant accomplishments and major contributions to agriculture in Cumberland County:

George Quigley has made a significant contribution to agriculture in Cumberland County through his involvement with Cooperative Extension, Master Gardener Program, Keep Fayetteville Beautiful, 2nd Harvest Food Bank, and the Cape Fear Botanical Garden. He is a staunch supporter of Cumberland County Cooperative Extension as he continuously serves as a spokesperson for the horticulture educational programs provided in the county. The Cumberland County Extension Master Gardener Program would not be the success it is today without the leadership and guidance of George Quigley. He has contributed over 8000+ volunteer hours in Cumberland County with Extension Master Gardeners and he refuses to receive any recognition. He was instrumental in establishing the Master Gardener Association in 2001. As a result of his efforts, today the Association is a successful; non-profit organization that provides horticulture

scholarships to youth, host annual plant sales, instrumental in supporting the Cape Fear Botanical Garden, etc. George has served as the Chairman of the Cumberland County Extension Advisory Council for over 18 years, a position he continues to hold today. He has also achieved emeritus status with the NC Cooperative Extension State Advisory Council. George is a dedicated member of the Cape Fear Botanical Garden serving as a board member, a tour docent, hands-on laborer, gardening class instructor, and school tour guide. In addition, he volunteers by teaching gardening classes at FTCC, led the effort to conduct a Farmers' Market Feasibility Study in 2015, coordinates tree plantings at schools in recognition of Arbor Day, is actively involved with horticulture/landscape Eagle Scout projects, serves as a horticulture speaker at home and gardening shows and garden clubs, provides consultations to home gardeners, leads the litter index for the City of Fayetteville and is an active member with Keep Fayetteville Beautiful. Each year George works with Cooperative Extension in the planning of an annual agricultural tour for elected officials. George is adamant that the tour showcase Cumberland County agriculture. George has been committed to Cumberland County agriculture, not for monetary gain, but for his love and passion for the agriculture community. He gives back to this community, not for recognition, but because of his dedication and commitment to Cooperative Extension and Cumberland County.

The bid received was over the project budget amount and therefore negotiations began with the contractor to arrive at a mutually acceptable amount for both parties. The contractor was able to modify the unit prices due to favorable soil conditions discovered after completion of exploratory digging activities within the project area. The negotiated bid price is now \$3,600,000.
