Chairman Faircloth called the meeting to order and welcomed Kirk deViere, Fayetteville City Council.

INVOCATION AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE – Commissioner Lancaster provided the invocation followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

1. Approval of Agenda

MOTION: Commissioner Evans moved to approve the agenda.

SECOND: Commissioner Council VOTE: UNANIMOUS (7-0)

2. Presentation on Connect NC Bond by Dr. Larry Keen, President, Fayetteville Technical Community College, Dr. James Anderson, Chancellor, Fayetteville State University, and Jane Conolly, Carvers Creek State Park Superintendent

Dr. Larry Keen, President, Fayetteville Technical Community College, stated Connect NC is a \$2 billion bond project proposal for strategic investments in our state's public infrastructure, higher education, state parks, agriculture, safety, and water and sewer infrastructure that will cultivate a stronger economy, improve quality of life and provide improved facilities for education and training, and enhance the safety of our food and our citizens. Dr. Keen showed a short video depicting how Connect NC will impact the community. Dr. Keen stated voters will have the opportunity to vote on the issuance of Connect NC public infrastructure bond in the primary election on March 15, 2016.

Dr. Keen stated Connect NC Improvement Projects include the following:

- Higher Education
 - o NC Community College System-\$350 million for new construction
 - o UNC System \$980 million to build and repair STEM facilities
- State Parks and Attractions
 - o \$75 million to update facilities at 45 state parks
 - o \$25 million for the N. C. Zoo to support facilities, trails, exhibits
- National Guard Facilities

- o \$70 million for Readiness Centers in Burke, Guilford and Wilkes Counties
- Water and Sewer Infrastructure
 - o \$309.5 million for statewide water and sewer to meet demands of growing population
- Agricultural Research
 - o \$85 million for N. C. State Plant Science Research
 - o \$94 million for Agriculture and Consumer Sciences Building for protecting N. C. citizens and their food supplies

Dr. Keen stated Connect NC will have the following impact on Cumberland County:

- \$10.7 million for Fayetteville Technical Community College
- \$10 million for Fayetteville State University
- \$5.7 million for Carver's Creek State Park

Dr. Keen pointed out that Connect NC is separate from the City of Fayetteville's bond. Dr. Keen asked the Board of Commissioners to support Connect NC.

Amy Cannon, County Manager, recognized Lisa Childers, Cooperative Extension Director and George Quigley, Cooperative Extension Chairman, and stated both represent the N. C. State University system and the significant funding under the Connect NC Bond that will go towards agriculture. Ms. Cannon also brought attention to Item 3.G. Approval of Resolution Supporting Connect NC Bond Act.

Dr. Anderson, Chancellor, Fayetteville State University, asked everyone to think about where the community will be ten to fifteen years from now without the passage of this bond. Dr. Anderson stated the community is very fortunate to have two bonds to support; one that will broaden support for the community college and university education systems and another that will directly benefit the City of Fayetteville to support economic development. Dr. Anderson stated it has become increasingly difficult to stay competitive in today's global world and Connect NC will mean the difference in offering state-of-the-art learning to N. C. citizens.

Jane Conolly, Carvers Creek State Park Superintendent, outlined the Connect NC Bond Project for Carvers Creek State Park as follows:

- Renovations of the Rockefeller House (on the National Register of Historic Sites) for public use to include educational programs and space for school groups and the general public, exhibits interpreting the natural and cultural history of the park, rental space for family reunions, weddings, meetings, park gift shop, public restroom and park administrative offices
- Improved road access and parking
- As the funds allow for a bridge across the creek to allow development of a picnic area to include picnic shelters, ADA fishing access to the Millpond, public restroom and road access and parking.

Chairman Faircloth thanked Dr. Keen, Dr. Anderson and Superintendent Conolly for their presentations.

C. Approval of Delinquent Real Property Taxes for the Year 2015 and Direct the Tax Collector to Advertise the Tax Liens

BACKGROUND:

North Carolina General Statute 105-369 requires the Tax Administrator to report unpaid taxes for the current fiscal year that are liens on real property by the first Monday in February. The purpose of the reporting is to allow the Board of Commissioners to order the Tax Administrator to advertise the tax liens. Upon receipt of the order, the Tax Administrator will advertise the tax liens by posting notice at the County Courthouse and by publishing each lien at least one time in one or more of the newspapers having general circulation in Cumberland County.

The statute requires that advertisement period to occur during the period of March 1st through June 30th. It is the Tax Administrator's intention to deliver an updated list of delinquent taxes to the newspaper in the month of June for advertisement. The current delinquent report will be on display in the Clerk's office through February 1, 2016 in CD or printout format. After this date, the report will be available in the Tax Administrator's office.

Total delinquent taxes on real property for Year 2015 as of 1/25/16: \$12,547,979 on 16,044 parcels

- d. Health Child Service Coordination revision in the amount of \$67,223 to budget additional Medicaid Case Management Fees allocated to hire additional temporary case workers. (B16-187) Funding Source State

Revision in the amount of \$313,329 to rebudget Article 40 Sales Tax to fund new Category I expenditures as approved by the Cumberland County Board of Education on January 12, 2016. (B16-183) Funding Source – Other

Revision in the amount of \$11,924 to transfer the remaining amount over to Social Service's operating budget for fifty percent reimbursement from the state. (B16-188/188A) Funding Source – Other

4. Consideration of Approval of Interlocal Agreement to Extend the Current Sales Tax Distribution Method through June 30, 2019

BACKGROUND:

At a special meeting on Thursday, January 28, 2016, the Fayetteville City Council agreed to continue the distribution of sales tax revenue based upon the original Interlocal Agreement dated October 1, 2003.

Recorded below is the proposed Interlocal Agreement approved by the City Council which addresses the following key provisions:

- 1) Extension of the current sales tax distribution method for three (3) additional fiscal years through June 30, 2019.
- 2) The parties will begin discussing a new Sales Tax Distribution Interlocal Agreement no later than January 2017.

This proposed Interlocal Agreement will need the approval of the remaining eight municipalities in the county.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED AGREEMENT:

Approve the Interlocal Agreement as recorded below which extends the existing Sales Tax Distribution Interlocal Agreement through June 30, 2019.

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT

COUNTY OF CUMBERLAND

THIS INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT, is entered into during the month of January 2016, as indicated by the date executed by each party, by and among the City of Fayetteville (hereinafter "Fayetteville"), the Town of Spring Lake (hereinafter "Spring Lake"), the Town of Hope Mills (hereinafter "Hope Mills"), the Town of Stedman (hereinafter "Stedman"), the Town of Wade (hereinafter "Wade"), the Town of Falcon (hereinafter "Falcon"), the Town of Godwin (hereinafter "Godwin"), the Town of Linden (hereinafter "Linden"), the Town of Eastover (hereinafter "Eastover") and the County of Cumberland (hereinafter "County").

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, sales tax revenues have been distributed among the parties to this agreement pursuant to an Interlocal Agreement dated October 31, 2003, effective for the fiscal year which commenced on July 1, 2004, and as amended and supplemented from time to time (hereinafter "the Sales Tax Distribution Interlocal Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the current Sales Tax Distribution Interlocal Agreement extension expires at the end of the current fiscal year on June 30, 2016; and

WHEREAS, the parties deem it in the best interest of their citizens to continue the distribution of sales tax revenue pursuant to the Interlocal Agreement as previously amended and supplemented.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties agree that the existing Sales Tax Distribution Interlocal Agreement shall be extended and remain in effect for a period of three (3) additional fiscal years until June 30, 2019, in accordance with the terms and provisions contained therein and that the parties will begin discussing a new Sales Tax Distribution Interlocal Agreement no later than January, 2017.

Unless otherwise changed herein, all other terms and provisions contained in the Sales Tax Distribution Interlocal Agreement as amended and supplemented remain the same and unchanged.

This extension of the Sales Tax Distribution Interlocal Agreement shall be approved by the governing body of each party and entered into the minutes of the meeting at which it is approved.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the parties, intending to be bound and by authority duly given, have caused this Agreement to be signed by their appropriate officials, the day and year designated by each.

5. Consideration of Approval of Contract for Leasehold Improvements with Alliance Behavioral Healthcare

BACKGROUND:

The Board considered the contract with Alliance Behavioral Healthcare for leasehold improvements at the Executive Place offices of Alliance and directed that Section 5, pertaining to the approval of any change orders, be rewritten to provide that any change orders must be recommended by the design engineer and approved jointly by the parties. Section 5 has been rewritten to provide that any change orders must be approved jointly by Alliance and the Board of Commissioners or its designee. Counsel for Alliance reports this language is acceptable to Alliance.

RECOMMENDATION/PROPOSED ACTION:

Consider approval of the contract with the revisions to Section 5 as recorded below.

NORTH CAROLINA

CUMBERLAND COUNTY

This Agreement, is made and entered into the ___day of February, 2016, by and between Alliance Behavioral Healthcare, a Managed Care Organization existing under N.C.G.S. Chapter 122C, having a principal office at 4600 Emperor Boulevard, Suite 200, Durham, North Carolina, hereinafter referred to as "ALLIANCE," and the County of Cumberland, a body politic and corporate of the State of North Carolina, having a principal office at 117 Dick Street, Fayetteville, North Carolina, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, COUNTY is the owner of certain real property located at 711 Executive Place, Fayetteville, North Carolina; and

WHEREAS, ALLIANCE is a tenant of a portion of that building (the "Premises") under a lease with a term commencing January 1, 2016; and

WHEREAS, ALLIANCE desires certain leasehold improvements to the Premises for a more efficient service delivery and to comply with its facility and accreditation guidelines; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY has agreed to make the requested leasehold improvements in accordance with the terms set forth in this Agreement as follows:

- 1. ALLIANCE has provided COUNTY with a program plan developed by the Raleigh, North Carolina, office of Heery International, Inc., ("Heery"), which provides a general schematic of the leasehold improvements ALLIANCE desires. A copy of the program plan is attached hereto as Exhibit A. To the extent any language in the program plan documents included in Exhibit A is inconsistent with the language in any provision of this Agreement, the language in this Agreement shall control.
- 2. ALLIANCE has also provided COUNTY with the CAD file for the program plan created by Heery.
- 3. COUNTY shall use the Heery program plan as set out in Exhibit A and the CAD file to solicit bids for the design work for the leasehold improvements.
- 4. COUNTY shall be solely responsible for bidding and managing the design and the construction of the leasehold improvements in accordance with the North Carolina General Statutes.
- 5. (a) COUNTY shall keep ALLIANCE informed of the progress and status of both the design work and the construction.
- (b) ALLIANCE and the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners must jointly approve the final design of the leasehold improvements.
- (c) ALLIANCE and COUNTY staff shall jointly evaluate the construction bids; however; selection of the contractor shall be done by the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners.
- (d) Any change orders must be recommended by the design professional. ALLIANCE and the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners, or its designee, must jointly approve any change orders except those the design professional certifies as necessary to maintain the structural integrity of the building or any of its components, or are necessary to comply with the applicable building code. Any change orders so certified by the design professional shall be approved solely by the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners or its designee.
- 6. ALLIANCE shall select all office furnishings, security features, and fixtures, to be used in the leasehold improvements and COUNTY shall be responsible for purchasing such furnishings and fixtures in accordance with the North Carolina General Statutes.
- 7. ALLIANCE shall be responsible to pay for all aspects of the design work, construction of the leasehold improvements and any office furnishings to be used in the leasehold improvements, which improvements, furniture and fixtures are estimated to cost approximately \$1,300,000. COUNTY shall submit all approved invoices submitted to it to ALLIANCE for payment. ALLIANCE shall directly pay all approved invoices submitted to it by COUNTY'S Contractors. ALLIANCE shall make all payments under this contract from the Cumberland County local funds being carried forward from any annual funding agreements to which COUNTY and ALLIANCE were or are parties.
- 8. COUNTY designates County Engineer Jeffrey Brown as the person with whom ALLIANCE should direct all communications with respect to any matter covered by this Agreement.

- 9. ALLIANCE designates ______ as the person with whom COUNTY should direct all communications with respect to any matter covered by this Agreement.
- 10. During the construction of the leasehold improvements, ALLIANCE shall vacate any portion of the Premises in which the construction is taking place and shall relocate its employees and operations in the portion of the Premises in which construction is not taking place in accordance with the terms of the lease commencing January 1, 2016. COUNTY shall insure that construction does not simultaneously occur on multiple floors of the Premises without the consent of ALLIANCE to the end that ALLIANCE shall at all times during construction have the use of at least one of the floors of the Premises without construction taking place on the floor being occupied.
- 11. COUNTY shall proceed to select a design professional upon approval of this Agreement by both parties and shall proceed to select a contractor and commence construction as soon as is practicable after the design work is completed.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the parties have caused this Agreement to be executed in duplicate originals by their duly authorized officers.
